EFFECT OF SPRING ON MARKET PRICES

Eggs Likely to Become Cheaper and Tuberos Vegetables Dearer—Tangerines on Sale.

The season has not yet arrived for very much variation in market prices. Eggs are holding at a good price owing largely to the cool weather. They are, however, likely to take a drop at any time. The stocks of packed eggs are becoming small and very soon this season's laying will be the only available for cooking purposes.

This is the season when tubers begin to deteriorate in quality, especially if not kept quite dry. Onions are shooting and good ones are consequently going up in price.

Florida grape fruit is dropping a little, the retailers selling three for twenty-five cents instead of ten cents each. Tangerines are seen at the local groceries for the first time and the price is 20c. a dozen. The complete prices for the week are as follows:
