JACK JOHNSON SAYS BOXING GAME FIXED

He Was to Get Large Amount of Cash and to Return to Claim Property.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Havana, March 14.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion fighter of the world, in a signed statement says he regards his fight with Jess Willard four years ago as a pre-arranged affair. He allowed Willard to win. Johnson was to have in addition to \$30,000 cash, the entire rights to the moving picture films in Europe and a third of all the proceeds from their exhibition in the United States and Canada.

It is mentioned by Johnson that together with the financial consideration was a promise of aid to settle his difficulties in Chicago so that the colored pugilist might return to reclaim his property and see his mother.

WATER NOTICE USE AND STORAGE
