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SOLDIER MEMBER THROWS MORE BOMBS INTO HOUSE OF COMMONS AT OTTAWA

DECLARES THERE WAS A REBELLION OF 40,000 BRITISH TROOPS AND 4,000 CANADIANS DID DUTY—SOME MEN WILL CURSE THE DAY THEY WERE BORN IF THEY DO NOT LET UP

Ottawa, March 17.—In his defence of the Canadian troops in the House of Commons at the week end Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., the member for Skeena, continued his arraignment of the speech of Sir Sam Hughes which criticised Sir Arthur Currie and the Canadian command.

Sir Sam Hughes, said Col. Peck, mentioned Col. John A. Currie remarking that Col. Currie should not be confused with another man who had acted discredibly on the field of battle. There was only one other man in the Canadian army with this name but if Sir Sam had another man than the leader of the Canadian corps in mind, he should come out like a man and tell who it was.

Sir Sam Hughes: "I mean Arthur Currie and will take the first opportunity of saying so in this House."

Col. Peck declared that if the campaign against Sir Arthur Currie continued, he would tell some things he knew and certain gentlemen would curse the day they were born.

Regarding Sir Charles Ferguson who had reflected on the honor of Canadians, he commanded the 17th corps at Arras when it went out of the town. Canadians had been rushed down on that account.

Sir Charles Ferguson gave up Monchy Le Preux. Who took Monchy? The Canadian corps.

Lots of things happened in the British army about which nothing was known. In 1917 he went into a town in which 40,000 British troops were in open insurrection, and 4,000 Canadian troops were taken to guard the railways and bridges.

GOSDEN CAUSES EXCITEMENT AT LABOR MEETING

Accused of Being Spy—Industrial Unionism Means Declaration of War on Capital.

(By mail).

Calgary, March 13.—A resolution supporting the policy of industrial unionism and separation from the international organization was passed amid the greatest enthusiasm at the Western Canada Labor conference this afternoon, and every delegate supported it earnestly on behalf of the several branches of labor represented.

Declaration of War.

That the passing of the above resolution is an automatic declaration of war on the part of labor people against the capitalistic classes of the world was the opinion of a majority of the delegates and when Delegate J. Taylor of Vancouver asked if that was what the resolution amounted to he was soon set at rest by the roar of approval which surged through the hall.

Another delegate was afraid that their efforts would be nullified by the class of labor men who would like it, but did not want it if there was any work attached to the getting of it. Now that the die was cast it was up to every one to roll up his sleeves and fight.

Opinions Expressed.

For three hours delegate after delegate took the floor and said why they should support the resolution and there was hardly a dissenting voice in the whole gathering. What feeble resistance there was was beaten down by the majority after the different points had been debated on.

Man after man approved of the resolution and scorned the idea of being afraid of the international trades and labor and when the vote was taken and carried the roof rang with the cheers and roars of the delegates.

Some excitement was caused during the afternoon when David Rees, secretary of the United Mine Workers of Alberta, took the floor and declared that there was a number of police spotters and secret service men in the hall, and that one man, William Gosden, alias Smith, alias Brown, well known in Calgary labor circles, and an "enemy" was in the balcony of the hall.

The Accusing Finger.

Every head turned in the direction of Mr. Rees' finger as he pointed to the figure of a man who sat in the balcony.

"That man," Mr. Rees said, "was known to the labor men as Smith. He went to Fernie, B.C., and tried to make strife there. (continued on Page Four.)"
