Minister Makes Good In Regard to Lumber.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo is to be congratulated on his efforts in securing for the province, through the British Timber Controller, a large order for lumber. In an interview given a News representative during Christmas week the Minister of Lands said that he had been working for some time to secure orders and that he expected before very long to meet with success. The delay has been somewhat annoying, but the first order has come at last and this district stands to benefit always by any improvement in the lumber business.

Slang is Simply Youthful English.

The Victoria Daily Colonist takes a column of editorial space to condemn the use of slang in the Legislature. Someone had been trying to express himself forcibly in modern colloquial and the Colonist did not like it. That staid and ancient publication ventured the opinion that the legislators should not only make laws but should set an example to the rest of the province in the matter of the use of the English language, not "as she is spoke," but as "she ought to be spoke."

We agree with the Colonist that slang while "zippy" and full of "pep" is not good form in a "joint" where the members "shoot off their faces" all day. We advise the legislators to "cut it," give it a "wide berth" or as the vulgar would say "let up."

While taking the stand that slang is not the best possible form for state occasions we must also express the opinion that the language used in the legal formulae could also be dispensed with. It, instead of being too young like slang, is too old. The middle aged is the dignified.

Slang is simply young English. It is used very largely by young people and from it the language grows. During the past few years the language has been growing very fast, so fast that people of two generations ago would hardly understand it as it is spoken today.

War was responsible for many slang words. Games have brought into use even more. The tendency today is to move fast, whether in language or anything else, and it is just as useless to preach against slang as against the tendencies of the new boy or the new girl. Some take pride in using slang while others take pride in abstaining. It is like whiskey, it grows on a person and creates an appetite for itself.

Baseball Becoming Most Popular Game.

There was a time when it was thought that lacrosse would be the national game of Canada and that in a few years it would be played everywhere. It has not made good, however, and instead of it, baseball is here to stay. The American game is capturing the country and nothing can stop it, even if anything wanted to do so.

Yesterday The News told of the commencement of the organization of a league here among the school boys. There will be a number of teams and every boy is being encouraged to take part. It is the most interesting development that has taken place this year. The boys who play organized games are seldom bad boys. They have not time or inclination to be. There must be some scope for their energies and if it is not found in one direction it will be found in another.
