WOUNDED BUT CARRIES ON WINS CROSS

Sgt. Hoffman Does Splendid Work Overseas and His Sister Gets His Decoration.

DIRECTS HIS MEN EVEN WHEN DYING

Sgt. Myron I. Hoffman, nephew of Harry Hoffman of this city, died a glorious death on the field of battle, winning the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action with the American army. A San Francisco paper tells of it in a recent issue as follows:
"Miss Florence Hoffman, a sister to Sergeant Hoffman, Red Cross nurse at Toul, France, has recently received from General Pershing a Distinguished Service Cross, awarded to her brother, Sergeant Myron I. Hoffman of the Three Hundred and Sixty-third Infantry for extraordinary heroism in action. Sergeant Hoffman was mortally wounded at the time he won this cross.

"Three members of the Hoffman family were enlisted in the service. Samuel O. Hoffman, a brother, is now in San Francisco, having been released from the aviation corps.

Official Statement.

"The incident which won the cross and cost Hoffman his life is described by Captain Ward M. Ackley as follows:

"When all his officers had been killed Hoffman assumed command and had the company reorganized and ready for action when I was placed in command.

"It was about 8:30 p. m. that he was hit, after returning from the first aid station, so as to get some severely wounded men back who could not be taken back in daylight, owing to the heavy fire. A shell burst on the road right by his side as he was coming up to me.

"He was carried back, himself directing the men who were carrying him, and had the men go out of their way so as to take him past the battalion post of command to deliver his daily report. For this act I recommended him for the Distinguished Service Cross."

"On a previous occasion Sergt. Hoffman while engaged in the Argonne battle, when all his officers had been killed or wounded, took command of his company and reorganized it for an attack. For this he was recommended for a commission.

"Sergeant Myron I. Hoffman was a former employee of the law firm of Brittain & Kuhl. Another uncle of the dead hero, Milton L. Schmidt, lives in Paris.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Re-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptor occupies claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

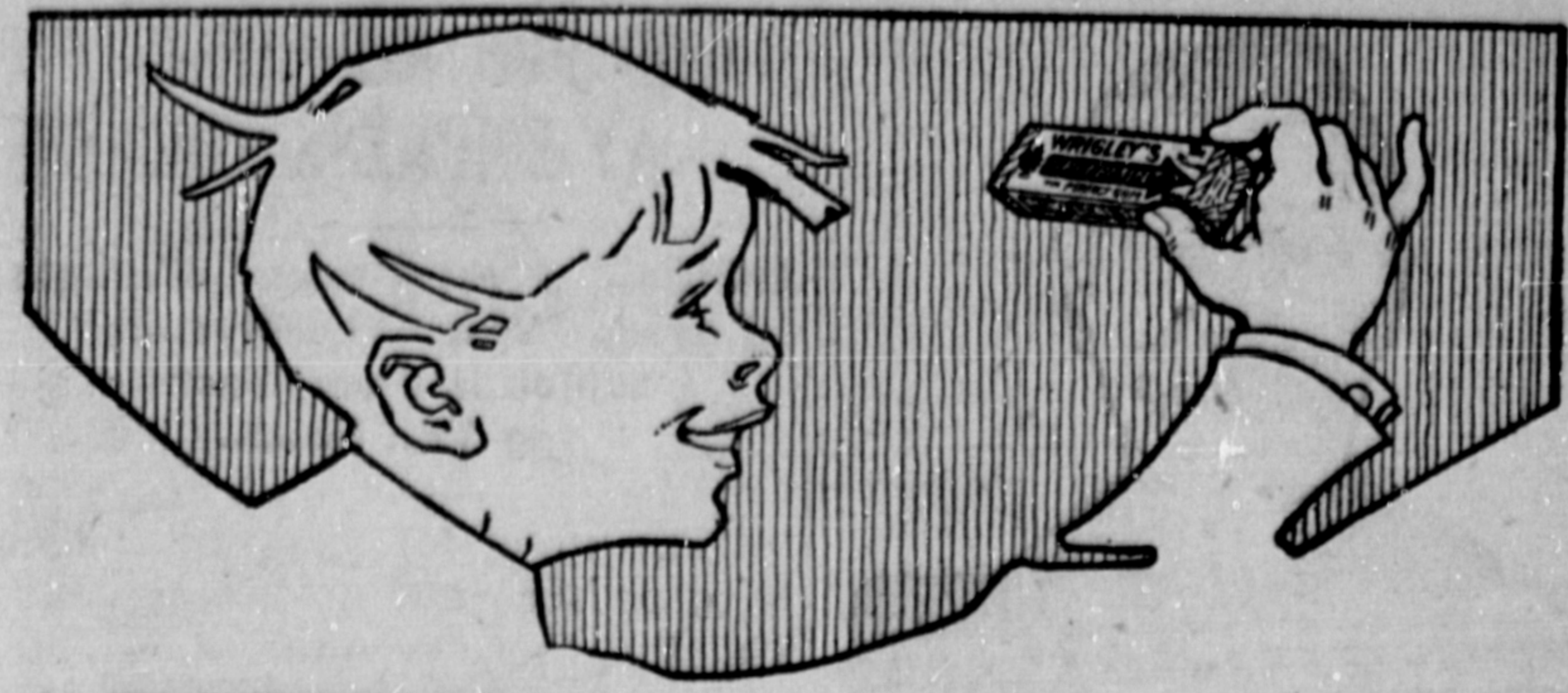
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
