NECHAKO LIBERALS IN ANNUAL MEETING

Ten New Members Join—Premier
Oliver's Land Policy
is Endorsed.

A well attended annual meeting of the Nechako Liberal Association was held on Saturday, March 8, in the Board of Trade Building, says the Vanderhoof Herald. The meeting was called to order by President J. B. Armishaw, and the general routine of business was taken up and passed satisfactorily.

A general debate took place on the land policy of the present government which resulted in the meeting being unanimously in favor of the action taken by the Oliver Government.

At the close of his term of office as president, Mr. Armishaw addressed the meeting, expressing his feeling of gratitude toward the association for the way they had strived to help the executive in the good work which they have been striving to accomplish.

New Members.

Ten new members were given admittance to the association. Some of the newly arrived settlers that have become members of the association expressed their pleasure in finding such a live Liberal association established in Vanderhoof.

Officers Elected.

The election of officers for the coming year was as follows: President, J. B. Armishaw; vice-president, Sam Milne; secretary, F. E. Donovan; executive committee, H. L. McKenney, G. Cameron, Dave Turcotte, Jos. Jones, Joe Beaudoin, and Harry Ingham. The only change from last year's executive being H. L. McKenney in place of Joseph Redmond, who had acted very efficiently during the past year, but who finding the duties rather too arduous expressed the desire to have some other person appointed in his place. A resolution was passed unanimously to have a memorial leaf placed in the books of the association expressing their grief at the loss of their esteemed leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Messrs. Herdmann and Campbell of Chilco did their part in the way of entertaining by their well placed and humorous speeches.

Assured Future.

The meeting throughout was in complete unity, and if appearances are indicative of what we may expect in the future we may be sure that Liberalism in the Nechako valley has an assured future. Delegates were elected to attend the annual convention of the Central Liberal Association, which is to be held sometime this month in Prince George.
