## TREASURER JOHNSON TELLS OF RUPERT

No Municipal Bill This Year—Compulsory Tax Sales to be Held Every Year.

The new municipal bill is not going through this year, only amendments were dealt with.

The municipal bill committee sitting at Victoria decided in favor of compulsory tax sales each year, and the elimination of the present costly system of advertising tax sales. Instead of having one set day for holding compulsory sales it was decided that such sales should merely be tied down to the month of September, giving the municipalities a leeway of thirty days in which to carry it out.

It was the unanimous opinion of the committee that a notice in the Gazette and the newspapers stating that a tax sale would be held on a certain day would be sufficient, without the enumeration of the various properties, and that the taxpayer should be notified of such sale merely by the attaching of a slip to his regular tax notice, stating that the property will be sold on a certain date if the arrears have not been met.

City Treasurer Johnson, of Prince Rupert, said that his city had held tax sales each year since 1913, and he cited an instance where 800 lots had been advertised for sale, but when the sale came off there were only 200 lots left to be sold for arrears. No soldiers taxes had been paid since 1914.

## LAND SETTLEMENT BOARD ACTIVITIES

Areas Gradually Being Brought Under Control by Means of New Policy.

Last year the Land Settlement Board granted loans totalling \$280,000. Altogether, the total loans issued to date aggregate \$1,484,850. These figures are derived from the annual report of the Chairman of the Board, and tabled by the Hon. E. D. Barrow, Minister of Agriculture, in the Legislature a few days ago.

and the Nechaco Valley, the former of 14,500 acres, the latter of 40,000 acres. Of these areas, in the first instance, there are 3,000 acres and in the latter 7,300 acres available for settlement.

An area for settlement of 1,500 acres has been established at Fernie, but the land will not be available until this spring. Similarly, 600 acres will be available at Cranbrook for cultivation at an early date. It is hoped to have 15,000 acres available at Courtenay during the summer.

The report also notes a proposal to have a small area of from two to three thousand acres in the Salmon River Valley, where land has been appraised for this purpose.

The Board has investigated a proposal to irrigate 8,000 acres of land at Cherry Creek, in the Kootenay District, and has made reports on the Coldstream estate, the Pitt Meadows lands, and lands at Creston.

The Board acts as drainage commissioners for the draining of 400 acres of land in the Cameron District, its members are also dyking commissioners for the Sumas reclamation scheme, which it is hoped will reclaim 30,000 acres of magnificent land at a cost of \$1,250,000.

### WATER ACT, 1914.

RIPARIAN RIGHTS
