### Unemployed Army at Ottawa Is Dispersed; Premier Warns Against Staging Disorders

OTTAWA, Aug. 3:—Staged as a counter-attraction to the Imperial economic conference, the workers' economic conference here is over. Leaders of the conference have ordered their followers to return to the various centres whence they came where it is planned to stage a series of demonstrations.

Half of the five hundred delegates who gathered here had departed from the city by today, mostly on trucks and freight trains, leaving fourteen of their

number in jail. Premier R. B. Bennett issued a-warning last night against any attempt being made to stage disorders here or elsewhere in the Dominion. "As long as there is a dollar left in the Dominion treasury, the law will be enforced to the hilt," the Prime Minister declared.
