LOW TARIFF MOTION VOTED DOWN IN PARLIAMENT BY GOVERNMENT SUPPORTERS

Declared it Was Not Wise and Should Not Have Been Made—Statement That Opposition Playing Politics and are Trying to Embarrass the Administration.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 26.—By a vote of 115 to 61 the House rejected the low tariff motion. The debate on the tariff started immediately the House opened on an amendment by A. R. Master of a motion to go into committee of supply. The five points in the amendment were:

Repeal of the extra war duty of five per cent on goods from Great Britain, and of 7 1/2 per cent on goods from other countries.

Acceptance of a reciprocity agreement with the United States.

Elimination of duties on raw materials.

Elimination of duty on machinery needed on the farm, the fishing, fishery and lumber industries.

A general downward revision of the tariff made after careful investigation and with the object of relieving the consumer of bringing more revenue to the state.

Mr. McMaster said if the farmers of British Columbia wanted to get machinery which was manufactured in Canada he would be free of duty from the land, but if there was a manufacturer in Nova Scotia turning out an article he wished to purchase, the British Columbia farmer would have to pay a high duty.

The position taken generally was that the motion was not made merely and was intended to embarrass the Government. Mr. Moore declared the motion was not wise and should not have been made.

Dr. Clark of Red Deer, a free trader, held that the amendment was not intended to embarrass the mover was playing the party game. Hon. T. A. A. followed along similar lines. Were the amendments carried, he said, the country would be plunged into a general election.

Thomas White, acting Premier, declared the amendment, if carried, would constitute a vote of no confidence.

Following the debate the House passed an interim supply bill for \$100,000 in five minutes.

**MORE DAYLIGHT
SAVING FOR CANADA**

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GENERAL STRIKE IN GREAT BRITAIN HAS BEEN AVOIDED

London, March 26.—Confidence prevails that the danger of stoppage of work by miners, railwaymen and transport workers has been avoided. A settlement of the main points is reported by the Government and the leaders of the unions.

AIRSHIP IN FLIGHT FOR NINETEEN HOURS

R-34 Flew From the Clyde to Dublin and Round Isle of Man.

London, March 26.—The British airship R-34 returned to the Clyde at noon today after a flight which kept her in the air continuously for 19 hours. The itinerary included a flight to Dublin, circling of the Isle of Man and home by way of Liverpool and the Midlands. The Evening Standard says the next flight will be over the ocean to make certain tests. An attempt will then be made to cross the Atlantic.

COMMUNITY SYSTEM OF LAND SETTLEMENT

Winnipeg, March 26.—In the province of British Columbia, a system of community settlement of the land by returned soldiers will be tried out in the near future, according to F. B. Stacey of Chilliwack, member for Westminster district in the Federal House who is en route west to consult with the British Columbia provincial authorities and Soldiers' Settlement Board as a representative of the Dominion Government.

EGYPT IS IN INSURRECTION

Government Had to Appeal to Men Being Demobilized to Return to Save Comrades.

London, March 26.—Defending the Military Service Bill in the House of Commons, Winston Spencer Churchill, Secretary for War, yesterday declared that the whole of Egypt was in virtual state of insurrection. The position was so dangerous, that the Government had to appeal to men on the point of demobilization to return and save their comrades from being murdered.

PRISONERS ESCAPED FROM OKALLA PRISON

Sawed Bars and Three Men Got Away, One Being an Indian.

Vancouver, March 26.—George Stone, charged with burglary on seven counts; Alex Ignace, an Indian from Kamloops on a murder charge, and Walter Martin, charged with highway robbery, sawed the bars in their room at Okalla Prison Farm and escaped. Other prisoners saw them working but gave no alarm.

ANYOX SAID TO RESUME OPERATIONS NEXT WEEK

New York, March 25.—It is understood that operations at the Granby Company's smelter at Anyox will be resumed by April 1. The plant has been closed since early in March, when fire damaged part of the works.

AMENDMENT TO PROHIBITION

Slight Tightening of Provisions of the Act Introduced Into Legislature.

Victoria, March 26.—Premier Oliver announced that there would be no referendum on prohibition in British Columbia this year as requested by the Moderation League. There were no other promises as to the future. An amendment to the Prohibition Bill was introduced by the Government providing for the issuance of liquor prescriptions by doctors only on special forms provided by the Government. Advertisements of liquor for sale are prohibited.

VICTORIA MAN BLOWS HIS OWN HEAD OFF

Victoria, March 26.—Walter Palmer, aged 69, a poultry farmer in the Lake Hill district, was found with part of his head blown off in a shed on Reynolds St. It is believed that he committed suicide.

SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA MAKES HIT

First Rate Mixed Entertainment Given by Army and Navy Veterans at Empress.

It was the subject of appreciative remarks everywhere and Mr. Harvey must feel flattered at the results he has been able to attain in a comparatively short time from a group of players, many of whom have had little or no experience in orchestral work. The next entertainment in which they take part will be looked forward to with much interest.

The concert given last night was the occasion under the auspices of the Army and Navy Veterans, the proceeds of which went toward furnishing their new club rooms. Ben Self gave the theatre and advertising free of charge for the occasion and he was publicly thanked from the platform by Major McMullin on behalf of the society, as also were all those who took part.

Humorous Songs.

The program was a mixed one with plenty of variety. The singing of humorous and topical songs by Frank Moore were among the best numbers. BOLSHEVIKI ABOLISHING EVERYTHING

Take Over Homes, Businesses and Art Treasures in Hungary; Abolish All Titles.

Amsterdam, March 26.—The new Hungarian Government at its first meeting Saturday, says a despatch from Budapest, decided to abolish all titles and rank, to separate church and state, and to dismiss all commissioners of the Karolyi Government, while inviting the workmen's councils to select directorates of four members each to replace them. The formation of revolutionary courts was decided upon and the council ordered the people's commissioners to take over all homes, businesses and art treasures in private hands.

FISHING BOATS WILL SOON BE AT WORK

Sitka May Get Away to Halibut Banks Tomorrow Night.
