TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL SESSION

Objection Taken to Union Men
Employing Oriental Carpenters
at Cow Bay.

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council on Tuesday night complaint was made by the carpenters that Oriental labor was being used at Cow Bay by many whom it was thought were members of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union. It was decided to take the matter up with the union interested.

The increase of the license fee for salmon trollers from one to five dollars was the subject of complaint. It was pointed out that the increase amounted to 400 per cent.

A proposal to establish a co-operative store was laid over for future consideration.

The advertisement of the B. C. Agricultural Association for a man to undertake the work for nine months for \$600 was touched upon and was the subject of some witticisms. It was suggested that an Oriental might be secured at the price.

Delegate Montgomery gave an informal talk on the Calgary convention, but the official report will be presented at a meeting on Tuesday evening next.

WATER NOTICE USE AND STORAGE

TAKE NOTICE that Pacific Coast Exploration Co., Ltd., whose address is Toronto, Ont., will apply for a licence to take and use 200 cubic feet per second and to store 4,000 acre feet or 174,940,000 cubic feet of water out of Cascade and Silver Creeks (streams), also known as draining Long Lake and other small lakes in the vicinity of the Big Missouri Group, which flows in a southerly direction and drains into the Salmon River about one mile south of the International Boundary Line.
