SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed

lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land: Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where 1 -emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per an-num and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may

record another pre-emption, if he refarm, without actual occupation, pro-vided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive. TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agree-ments to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be of persons to whom the purfrom the Crown has agreed to sell are also pretected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making applica-tion for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any applica-tion made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold et public auction. For information apply to any Provin-
