The second run of spring sal-

The latest catches seem to have
been taken around Stephens Is-
land and at Butler's Cove, where
the herring is in abundance.

VERY FEW HERRING

There are a very few herring
coming to Sitka this spring, ac-
cording to Capt. W. R. Hanlon
who is in Juneau with his herring
boat Albatross, says the Alaska
Empire. The herring are keep-
ing in deep water, and not school-
ing in the shallow waters near
shore, he said.

"The Norwegian fishermen,"
said Capt. Hanlon, "believe the
destruction of whales is doing
more than anything else to injure
herring fishing. The whales feed
on herring, and naturally, they
contend, the herring seek shallow
water where the whales cannot
pursue them. The lack of whales
permit the herring to stay in the
deep water. It is impracticable
to fish for herring in water deep-
er than fifty feet."

WATER NOTICE USE AND STORAGE

TAKE NOTICE that Pacific Coast Ex-
ploration Co., Ltd., whose address is Toronto,
Ont., will apply for a licence to take and
use 200 cubic feet per second and to store
4,000 acre feet or 17,240,000 cubic feet
of water out of Cascade and Silver Creeks
(streams), also known as draining Long
Lake and other small lakes in the vicinity
of the Big Missouri Group, which flows in
a southwesterly direction and drains into
the Salmon River about one mile south of
the International Boundary Line.
The storage-dam will be located at Long
Lake and other small lakes adjacent. The
capacity of the reservoir to be created is
about 300,000,000 cubic ft., and it will
flood about 400 acres of land (all rock).
The water will be diverted from the stream
at a point about the outlet of Long Lake
or a small lake below, at dam site, and
will be used for power and mining pur-
pose upon the mine and for tramways and
other power lines; described as land not
subdivided, except mining claims.
