CANADA MAY MODIFY HER OFFER

BRITISH AVIATRIX OUT FOR NEW ENDURANCE RECORD

British Delegation At Empire Conference Is Awaiting Expert Report

Expectation is That Both Canadian and Australian Proposals Will Be Revised—Compensation For Removal of Foods From Free List is Required

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—Modification of Canada's offer of preference for preference will probably be requested by British delegates at the Empire economic conference. The British delegation is awaiting the report of its own experts who are now studying the Canadian offer before deciding on a line of policy. In British circles, however, it is doubted whether either Canadian or Australian trade offers as they stand at present will be regarded as sufficient compensation for the imposition of preferential tariffs on wheat, meats and raw materials now on the British free list. It is, however, fully realized that actual bargaining has scarcely begun and that, in the coming negotiations, modifications on both sides will be quite within the usual order of things.

INDICTED BY JURY

Libby Holman Held Responsible For Death of Her Husband, Young Smith Reynolds

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C., Aug. 5.—Libby Holman was indicted by a Winston-Salem grand jury yesterday on a charge of murdering her husband, Smith Reynolds, heir of the Reynolds tobacco millions, who died at his home here a few weeks ago following an alleged wild party. Miss Holman is at present at her home in Cincinnati but her father has assured authorities here that she will be surrendered.

After spending a day at Madame Rajaut's beautiful summer resort, "The Dunes," at Tlell, Miss Lincoln motored down to Queen Charlotte City where she caught the steamer Prince John for the south.

While in the Inlet, Miss Lincoln paid a brief visit with Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Stevens. She said that she had always thought of the Queen Charlottes as a group of small islands away out in the Pacific with a few fishermen living on them. Instead, it had been a pleasant surprise for her to make the wonderful motor trip with James Denholme from Port Clements to Queen Charlotte City. Miss Lincoln was so much impressed with the Islands that she said she intended to spend all next summer on the Queen Charlottes, bringing with her a party of wealthy friends from San Francisco.

Flight Sergeant McCleery and Flying Officer Pugh Are Participating—Husband Will Assist in Refuelling of Amphibian Machine

HAMBLETON, Eng., Aug. 5.—Mrs. Victor Bruce took off this afternoon on an endurance record flight attempt. She is accompanied by co-pilot and radio operator and they are using an amphibian plane equipped with kitchen, dining room and shower bath. Mrs. Bruce calls it her "flying bungalow." It had been originally intended that Mr. Bruce would participate in the flight but, just before the take-off, it was decided that the aviatrix' husband would not go along. Flight Lieutenant W. R. McCleery, who has probably done more flying than any other man in England, took his place. Flying Officer J. B. W. Pugh went along as co-pilot. Mr. Bruce will fly in the refuelling machines.

Chicago Industrial Section Swept By Serious Fire Last Night; Six Million Damage
