#### Chicago Industrial Section Swept By Serious Fire Last Night; Six Million Damage

CHICAGO, Aug. 5:-- A devastating fire swept three full blocks of the southwest industrial section of Chicago last night and caused damage estimated at \$6,000,000. It was one of the largest and most serious conflagrations this metropolis has experienced in years.

Fire Chief Carmody and several of his men were injured. Fire fighting forces from all parts of the city responded to emergency call.

The fire is believed to have been caused by an explosion in a grain elevator.
