In the Letter Box

THE INNER LIFE

Among those who belong to the wage-earning class the pressure of grinding economic conditions has led to a materialistic conception of life. At every turn we are met with the cry—"With us it is a case of bread and butter." Following upon this it is not surprising to find that traditional religion is being crowded out of the minds of each. By traditional religion is meant that type of religion largely taught in our churches fifty years ago. A God dwelling in a heaven millions of miles away, who when he thought it necessary to interfere in this world broke in upon it as an external force.

As such a God, it is argued, allows the wage system with all its social injustice to prevail He cannot continue to be the God of the working people. As the result of such a conception of religion we find labor union meeting taking the place largely of church services. The thoughts of the wage-earning class are becoming more and more centred upon overturning the present industrial system in the hope that the golden age will come when capitalism is dethroned and labor is made supreme.

If true religion is to find its proper place in our community there must be a new approach to it, and that is from the side of the human mind. God is not a far-away Deity, occasionally breaking in upon the material order of things which surrounds us. God is spirit constantly working through the laws of the human mind, inspiring the souls of men with higher thoughts, loftier ideals, and nobler motives. The Spirit of Christ lives not in the distant stars but in the hearts of men.

Labor as a mechanical force expended on the materials of nature is undoubtedly the chief factor in the production of wealth but a mechanical force alone can never produce nobility of character and true happiness. While the possession of sufficient wealth by every class in society to life all above grinding poverty should be made a standard for which the whole community should strive, above all this there must still float the banner of a higher, nobler life if the human race is not to sink into degradation and decay.

Mutual Service.

The Spirit of Christ is the spirit of brotherly love and mutual service. The supreme need of men and women of all classes in society is to have more of this spirit in their souls as the source of their inner life from which springs their outer conduct.

If those of the capitalist class cannot catch this spirit of mutual service without a radical change in our industrial system, then our present system must give way to a better system, just as in the past slavery gave way to the wage system under the pressure of Christian sentiment.

If those of the laboring class cannot catch this spirit of mutual service but become absorbed in sharing the spoils with no sense of responsibility to the whole community, if they shut God out of their minds and crowd the Spirit of Christ out of their hearts, the last state of the laboring class will be worse than the first.
