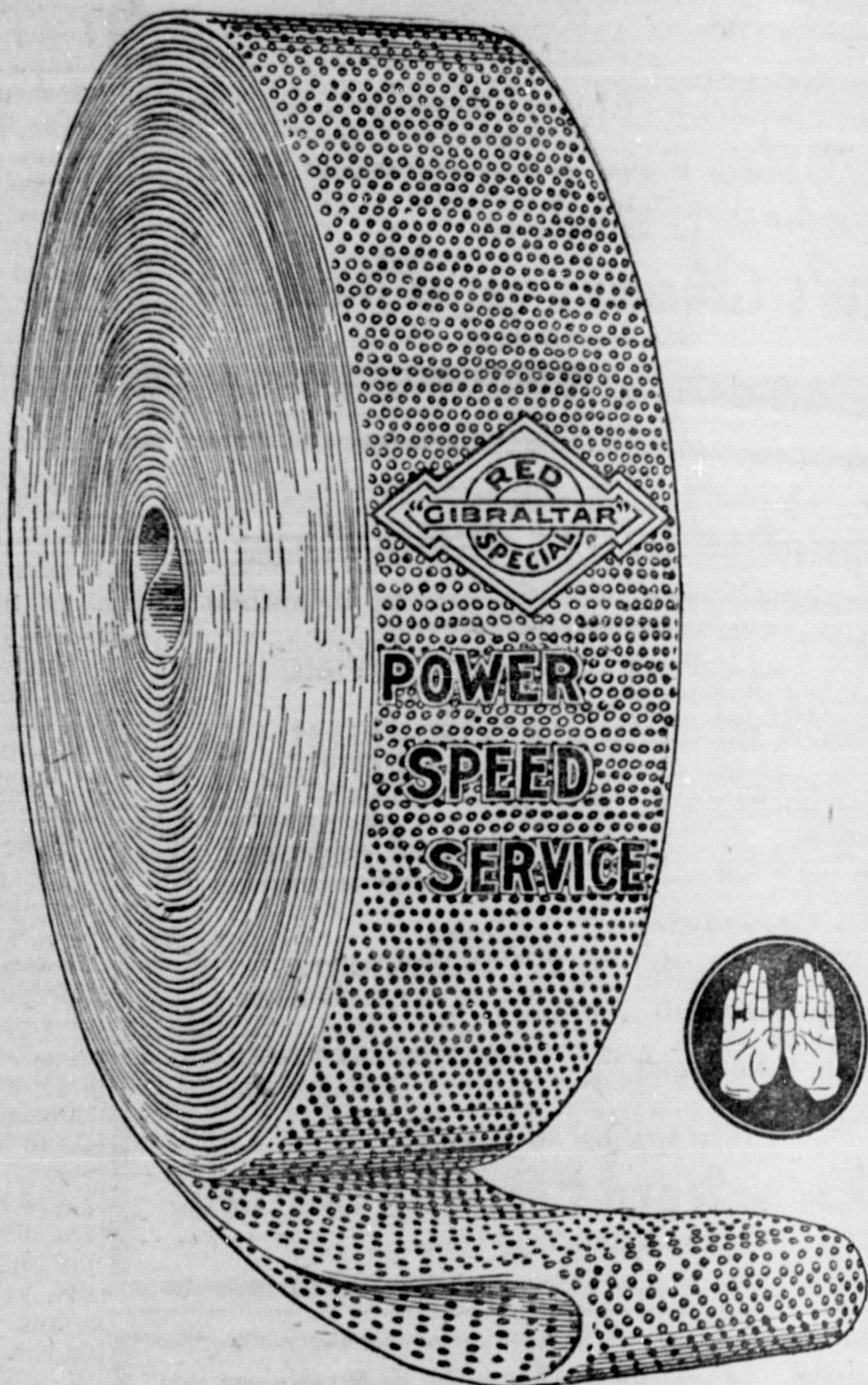

Lake and other small lakes in the vicinity
of the Big Missouri Group, which flows in
a southerly direction and drains into
the Salmon River about one mile south of
the International Boundary Line.
The storage dam will be located at Long
Lake and other small lakes adjacent. The
capacity of the reservoir to be created is
about 200,000,000 cubic ft., and it will
flood about 400 acres of land, (all rock).
The water will be diverted from the stream
at a point about the outlet of Long Lake
or a small lake below, at dam site, and
will be used for power and mining pur-
pose upon the mine and for tramways and
other power lines; described as land not
subdivided, except mining claims.

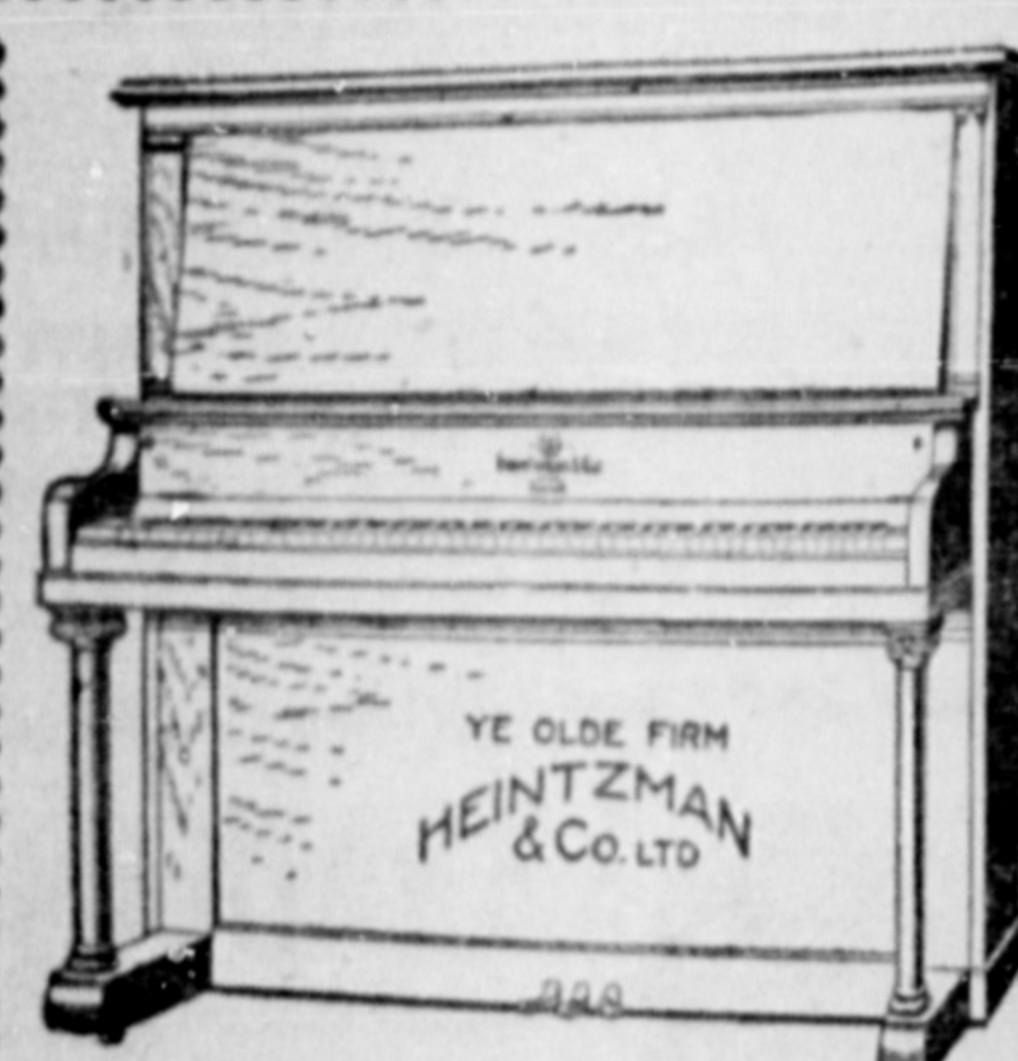
