**OIL COMPANY
TO PROSPECT
PEACE RIVER**

Concern Controlled by British
Government Asks Exclusive
Right on 60 Miles
Square.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, April 11.—Applica-
tion has been made to the Pro-
vincial Government by the Darcy
Exploration Co. for the exclusive
right to explore for petroleum in
the area of the Peace River coun-
try sixty miles square. The Gov-
ernment is considering the re-
quest.

It was the Darcy Co. through
which the Imperial Government
purchased the Persian Oil Fields,
said to be the largest in the world,
in order to secure them from
German influence. The Imperial
Government owns 62 per cent of
the stock in the company.

The request for permission to
prospect is accompanied by an
offer to pay a royalty of 12.5 per
cent. to the Provincial treasury
on the product of any wells.

**J. C. BRADY IS
OPTIMISTIC
AS TO FUTURE**

Lecture to St. Andrew's Society
On W. E. Gladstone He Strikes
a Happy Note.

It was an optimistic note that
was struck at the St. Andrew's
Society last night when J. C.
Brady gave a lecture on the life
and times of W. E. Gladstone.
His vivid picturization of the
conditions of life in England
when Gladstone was a young man
set many of the audience thinking
of the great progress that had
been made in so short a time and
thus inspired them with hope for
the future.

His Appeal.

Mr. Brady spoke of the interest
that should be taken in Gladstone
by a Canadian because he was the
first statesman who seemed to
grasp the importance of the colo-
nial empire outside of purely ma-
terial gain; to the Welshman he
appealed because he lived much
of his life at Hawarden Castle in
Flintshire; to the English because
he brought that country to the
highest stage of her parliamen-
tary power; to the Irish because
he brought home rule into the
realm of practical politics, and to
the Scotsman because he came of
an old Scots family.

His Ideals.

Gladstone was unselfish and
truthful. He gave up his old
friendships and much that he
held dear in breaking away from
his party and aligning himself
with the Liberal movement in the
country. He did this because he
recognized that to stay with his
party meant to be a barrier in the
path of democracy.

At the close a hearty vote of
thanks was given the lecturer for
the interesting and timely ad-
dress.

**HEAVY LOSSES FROM
TORNADOES IN TEXAS**

Dallas, April 11.—The latest
figures show that eighty-six per-
sons lost their lives in tornadoes
in northern Texas and part of
Oklahoma. Over 200 were in-
jured and the loss is placed at
over a million dollars.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed
lands only.
Records will be granted covering only
land suitable for agricultural purposes
and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished,
but parties of not more than four may
arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with
joint residence, but each making neces-
sary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for
five years and make improvements to
value of \$10 per acre, including clearing
and cultivation of at least 5 acres, be-
fore receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not
less than 2 years, and has made propor-
tionate improvements, he may, because
of ill-health or other cause, be granted
intermediate certificate of improvement
and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence
may be issued provided applicant makes
improvements to extent of \$200 per ac-
re and records same each year. Fail-
ure to make improvements or record
same will operate as forfeiture. Title
cannot be obtained on these claims in
less than 5 years, with improvements of
\$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared
and cultivated, and residence of at
least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may
record another pre-emption, if he re-
quires land in conjunction with his
farm, without actual occupation, pro-
vided statutory improvements made and
residence maintained on Crown granted
land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20
acres, may be leased as homesteads,
title to be obtained after fulfilling resi-
dential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes,
areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased
by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to
include all persons joining and serving
with His Majesty's Forces. The time
within which the heirs or devisees of a
deceased pre-emptor may apply for
title under this Act is extended from
one year from the death of such person,
as formerly, until one year after the
conclusion of the present war. This
privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT

Provision is made for the grant to
persons holding uncompleted Agree-
ments to Purchase from the Crown of
such proportion of the land, if divisible
as the payments already made will
cover in proportion to the sale price of
the whole parcel. Two or more persons
holding such Agreements may group
their interests and apply for a propor-
tionate allotment jointly. If it is not
considered advisable to divide the land
covered by an application for a propor-
tionate allotment, an allotment of land
of equal value selected from available
Crown lands in the locality may be
made. These allotments are conditional
upon payment of all taxes due the
Crown or to any municipality. The
rights of persons to whom the pur-
chaser from the Crown has agreed to
sell are also protected. The decision of
the Minister of Lands in respect to the
adjustment of a proportionate allotment
is final. The time for making applica-
tion for these allotments is limited to
the 1st day of May, 1919. Any applica-
tion made after this date will not be
considered. These allotments apply to
town lots and lands of the Crown sold
at public auction.
