PRICE OF MUTTON ADVANCES FIVE CENTS

Stiffening in Prices of Butter and Pork—Flower Seeds are in Demand.

With everyone expecting a reduction in prices, the opposite is occurring. Mutton has advanced five cents a pound and pork is higher. Butter, too, is higher than it was a week ago.

At this time of year of course apples are dear. That was to be expected. They are now selling at \$5 a box or from ten to fifteen cents a pound.

The scarcity of onions this year has made that commodity very dear. They are selling at

eight cents wholesale and the retailers are passing them on to customers at ten cents.

WATER NOTICE USE AND STORAGE

TAKE NOTICE that Pacific Coast Exploration Co., Ltd., whose address is Toronto, Ont., will apply for a licence to take and use 200 cubic feet per second and to store 4,000 acre feet or 174,240,000 cubic feet of water out of Cascade and Silver Creeks (streams), also known as draining Long Lake and other small lakes in the vicinity of the Big Missouri Group, which flows in a southerly direction and drains into the Salmon River about one mile south of the International Boundary Line. The storage-dam will be located at Long Lake and other small lakes adjacent. The capacity of the reservoir to be created is about 200,000,000 cubic ft., and it will flood about 400 acres of land, (all rock). The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about the outlet of Long Lake of a small lake below, at dam site, and will be used for power and mining purposes upon the mine and for tramways and other power lines; described as land not subdivided, except mining claims. 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
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TIMBER SALE X 1466.
