PETER VEREGIN TO SELL LAND

Signs Agreement in Presence of 500 Doukhobors and Returned Soldiers.

Grand Forks, B. C., April 13.—Returned soldiers yesterday took a hand in the fight of the Grand Forks Reconstruction Board to secure the Doukhobor lands in Canada for soldier settlement and went in a body to interview Peter Veregin, the head of the Doukhobor communities. At the suggestion of the veterans the Doukhobor leader in the presence of 500 followers signed an agreement to sell to the Government all Doukhobor lands in Canada or sell their lands in British Columbia and remove to more remote parts of the Dominion.

ASKS NO EXCLUSION OF JAPANESE FROM THE UNITED STATES

Sacramento, April 13.—United States Foreign Secretary Lansing wires from Paris to the Secretary of State of California asking on behalf of President Wilson that he will not introduce or consider any proposed bills looking to the exclusion of Japanese from California.

CAPT. JULIUS HENSHAW IS RETURNING HOME

Among the well known Vancouver people now on their way home from overseas are Mr. and Mrs. Charles G. Henshaw. Mr. and Mrs. Henshaw are expected home this week. Mrs. Henshaw, who holds the rank of captain, is one of the few Vancouver women decorated during the war. In addition to the honor conferred upon her by the Canadian military authorities, the French Government has conferred upon her the Croix de Guerre, with star, for bravery for evacuating and recuperating inhabitants under shell fire and aerial bombardment with a devotion and courage worthy of the highest praise.

Capt. Henshaw went to England shortly after the outbreak of war and took up war work. Later she returned to Canada and made a lecture tour, raising sufficient funds under the Canadian War Contingent, to give a Christmas gift to every Canadian at the front. Since then Captain Henshaw has been working in France and has seen service very close to the front lines as the wording of the several dispatches have shown and also the French mention of the recent honor.

CANADIAN CARGOES MUST BE DEVELOPED

"It is regrettable that 90 per cent of the cargo now being loaded on the Dollar boats for the Orient originated in the United States, and I hope to see the time when this proportion of the cargoes out of Vancouver will be Canadian, and out of Seattle, too, for the matter of that," said Alex. Johnston, deputy minister of marine and fisheries, as he addressed the shipping bureau of the Vancouver Board of Trade recently.

Mr. Johnston explained the policy of the department is to aid as much as possible all navigation on the Pacific coast but pointed out the setback the war had been to the plans of the department.

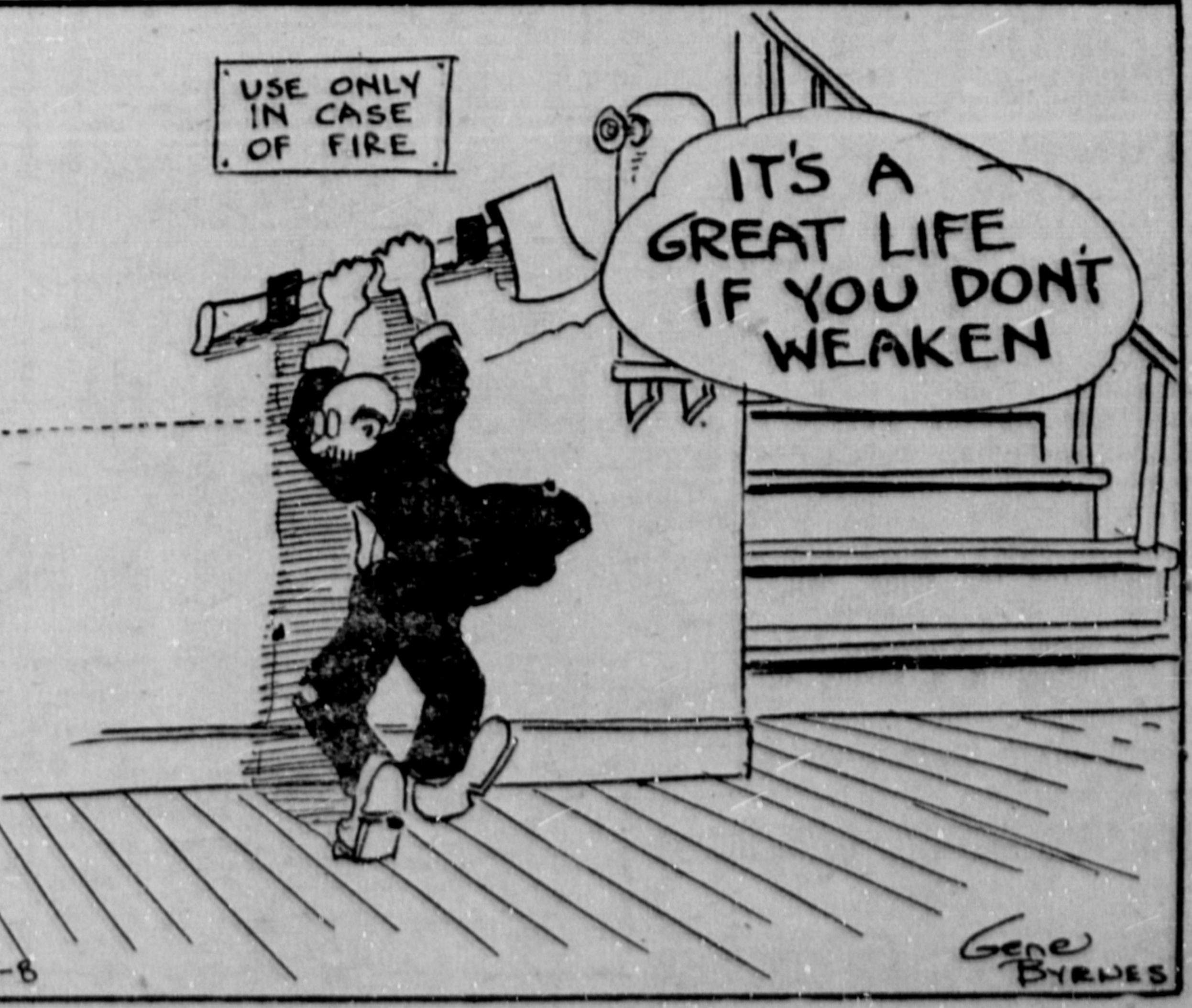

LAND REGISTRY ACT. (Sections 36 and 134.) Application No. 10,554-1. File 6082. TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Frank W. Hart, of Prince Rupert, B. C., as owner in fee under a Tax Deed from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 9th day of December, 1918, of ALL AND SINGULAR premises situate, lying, and being in the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly shown and described as Lot twenty (20), Block 19, Section Six (6), City of Prince Rupert (Map 923). You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice which may be effected by publication in the daily newspaper, and your attention is directed to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:— "In default of a caveat or certificate of pending being filed before the registration of such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land under the provisions of this Act, shall be deemed to have accepted and debarred from setting up any claim or in respect of the land sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes." WHEREAS application has been made for a Certificate of Indefeasible Title of the above-mentioned lands, in the name of Frank W.
