LIGHTHOUSE ON BARRETT ROCK

Tenders Being Asked by Department of Marine for Concrete Tower at Prince Rupert

The Department of Marine is asking for tenders for the construction of a concrete tower on Barrett Rock, near Prince Rupert, on which will be placed a light and a fog alarm, says the Victoria Colonist. Situated at the entrance to Rupert harbor, four miles away from the town, the new navigation aid will prove of great value to the vessels on the coast. A gas and bell buoy is now stationed close to the rock, but in a fog or snowstorm navigators find great difficulty in picking up the harbor entrance and getting their bearings before attempting the narrow passage which leads to Prince Rupert. The Department of Marine decided to build the aid, following representations by master mariners of the steamship companies.

The concrete tower, 38 feet high, will hold an Aga light operated by compressed gas and capable of burning from six to eight months without attention. The fog alarm to be placed on the tower will be of the remote control type, being operated by electricity generated on shore and sent to Barrett Rock through a submarine cable. Besides the tower, the Department of Marine is calling for tenders on a dwelling house to be built on the shore opposite the rock and one-third of a mile away. Here the electricity for the alarm will be generated by gasoline engines in the basement, while the attendant will use the rest of the structure as a dwelling.

The light and alarm are exactly the same as those at the end of the breakwater at Ogden Point which is the only installation of its kind yet on the British Columbia coast.

The Grand Trunk Railway has given the Marine Department the right to encroach on its right-of-way to construct the dwelling, which will project over the water.

Tides will be favorable for seeing the foundation of the tower between April 28 and May 5, when the rock will be dry.

SEVERAL STRIKES IN THE EASTERN STATES

Port Marine Workers and Rapid Transit Employees Out in New York.

New York, April 17.—Two strikes are threatening. The port marine workers' affiliation have called a walkout for today because three union tug crews have been called upon to tow barges owned by non-union firms.

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit employees threaten to walk out for the purpose of securing recognition of the union.

Boston, April 17.—On the second day of the strike of the 8,000 telephone operators the electrical workers announced that they would go out in sympathy to the number of 12,000. Up to noon yesterday 900 had gone out.

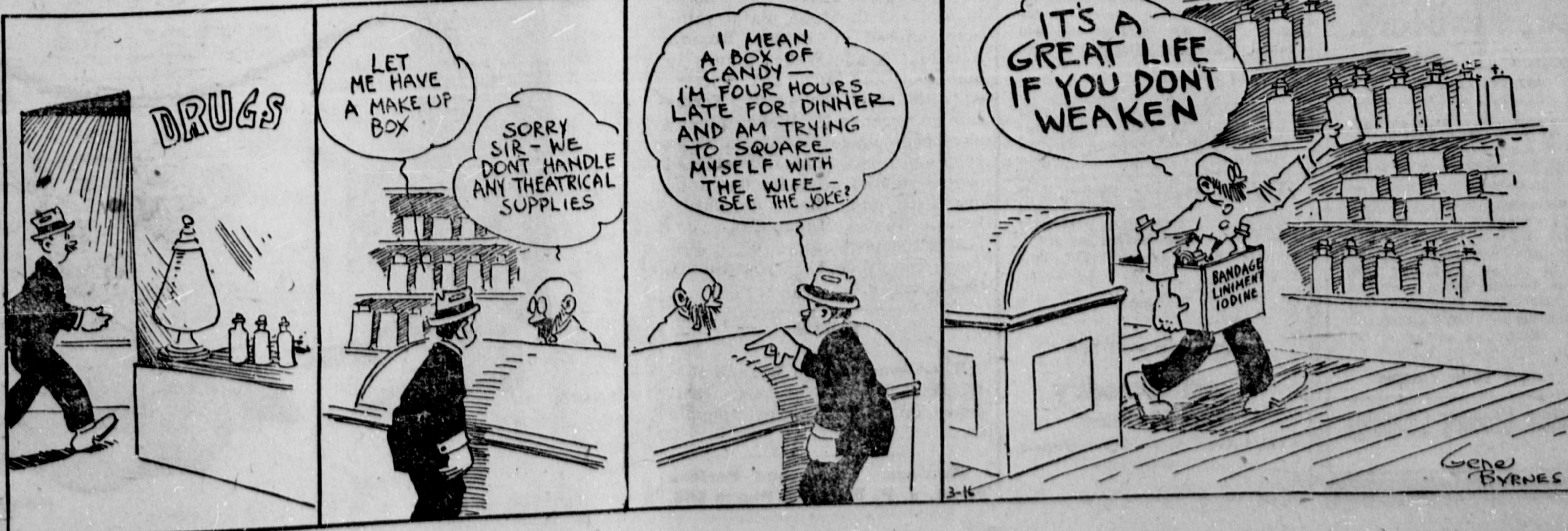

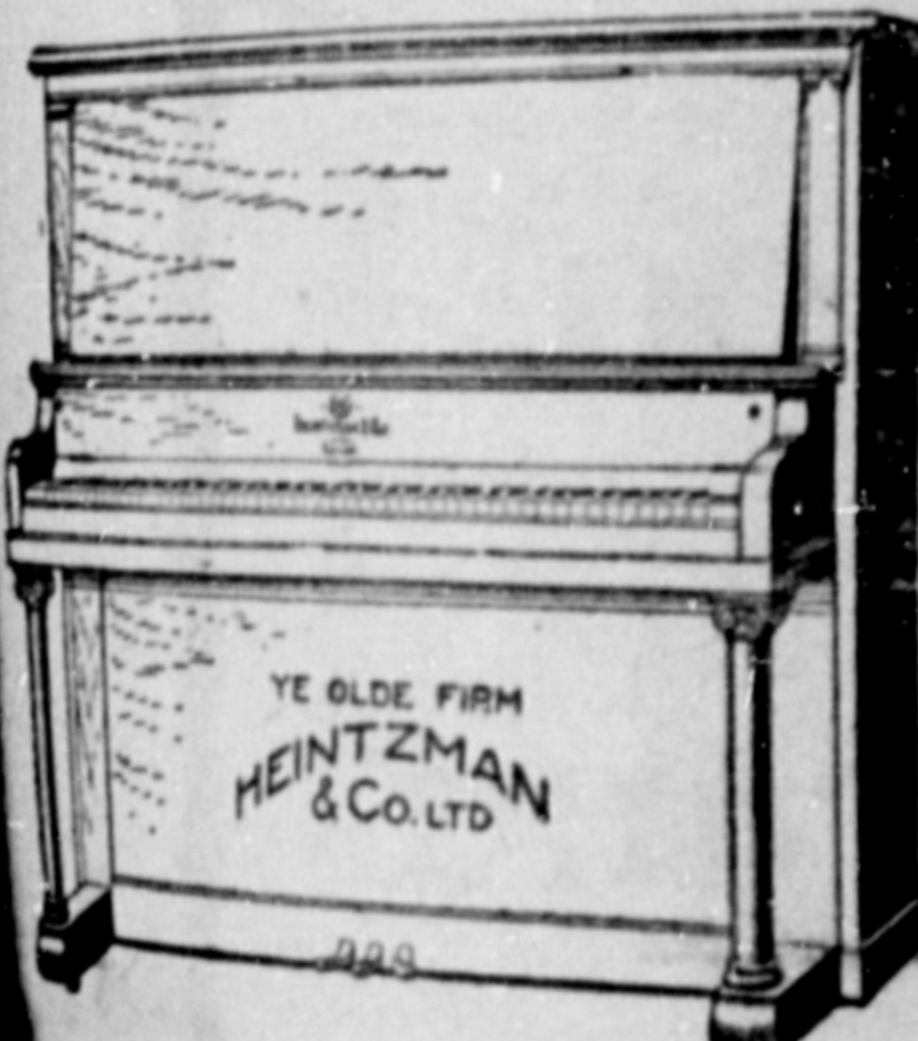
