BILLY CARR OF UNITED STATES WINS 400-METRES

PHILLIES BEAT CUBS

Assault Upon National League Stronghold Renewed—Cards Drop to Seventh Place

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 6.—After a one-day lapse, the Phillies continued their assault upon the National League strongholds yesterday, defeating the Chicago Cubs thoroughly to advance to within one game of second place. The New York Giants defeated the world champion St. Louis Cardinals and dislodged them from sixth place. The lowly Cincinnati Reds eked out a close victory over the Boston Braves who are having a struggle to keep in fourth place ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

In the American League, the Cleveland Indians defeated the Boston Red Sox and climbed to within one game of the second place Philadelphia Athletics who were losing a close struggle with the St. Louis Browns. The Detroit Tigers shut out Washington and are renewing their threat against the Senators' fourth place position. The leaders in both leagues, Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Yankees, had an idle day.

New Record Turned in By Speedy Yank; Ben Eastman Second While Wilson of Canada Finished Third

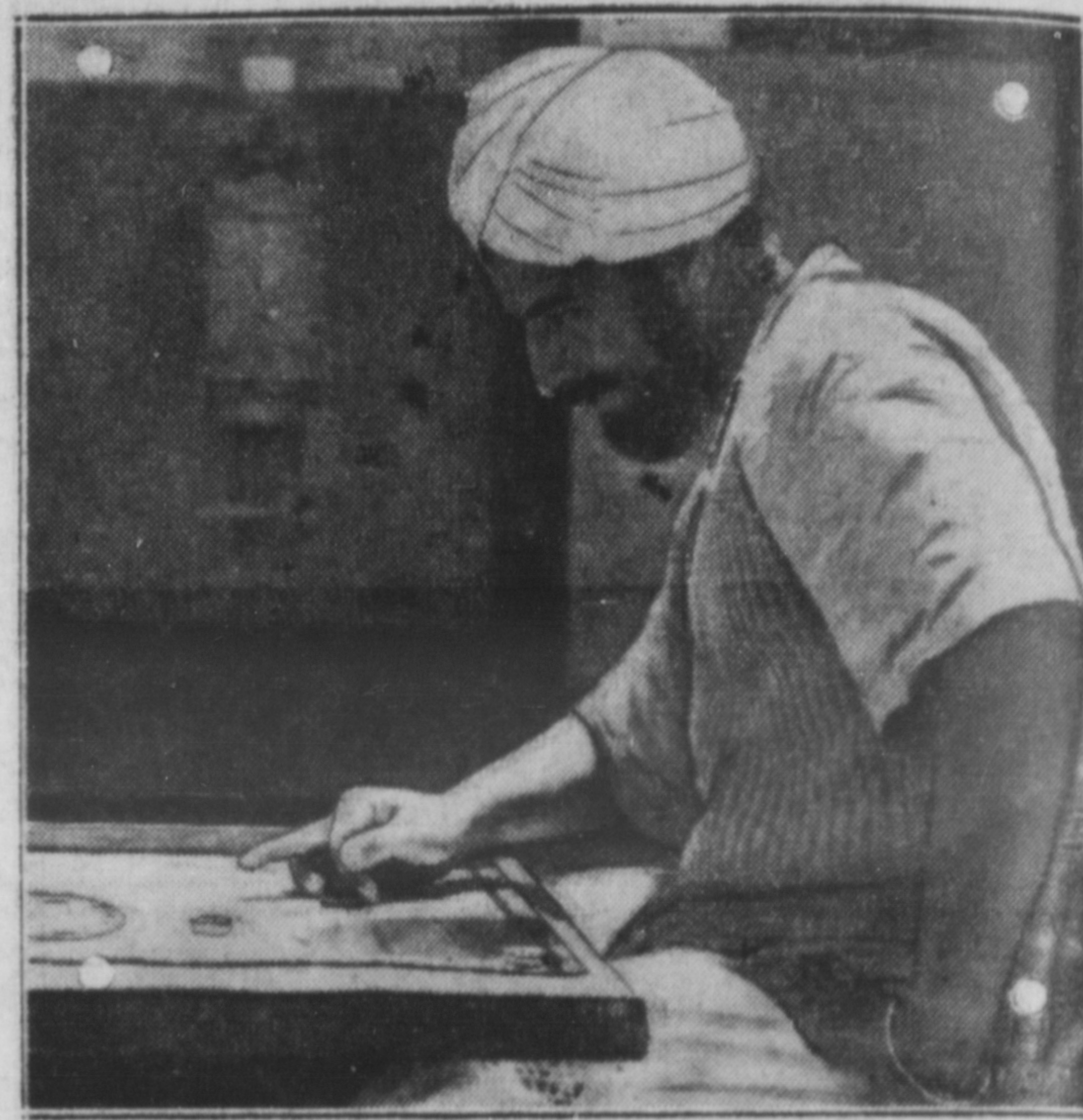
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—Coming up from behind and overtaking Ben Eastman who had set the pace, Billy Carr of United States carried off the honors in the final of the 400-metre dash at the Olympic Games here yesterday, creating a new world's record of 46 2-10 seconds. The former world's record was 47 seconds flat and the former Olympic record of 47 4-10 seconds. Carr led Eastman by only two paces. Alex Wilson of Montreal was third, Walters of South Africa fourth and Gordon of United States fifth.

GREAT DISAPPOINTMENT

Those of our good friends who have been looking for an upsetting of the whole social structure in Canada and the United States are feeling bitterly disappointed at the recent turn in affairs for the better. They had hoped to see the city in bankruptcy, the province in the hands of a receiver and a proletarian rule inaugurated at Ottawa but instead of that the city is getting out of its difficulties there is likely to be a change for the better soon at Victoria and Bennett has the affairs of the Dominion well in hand and is making a mark at the Empire conference.

In these matters somebody always has to be disappointed and this time it is the red revolutionists who are still hoping in spite of the strong tendencies against them.

THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

Judging from all the reports, mostly unofficial, that come from Ottawa, the Imperial conference will be successful in making arrangements for the interchange of goods among the different nations interested. Those who consider the progress slow must remember that there are a number of nations taking part, each with its own particular axe to grind and that the interests of each has to be considered just as carefully as the interests of Canada.

If the British Empire is to be permanent, there must be no mistakes made at this gathering. There may be revisions later but only minor revisions. The general principles have to be laid down now. In a part of this kind each party must benefit. We look to see great results from the deliberations now going on.

NEW YORK REPORT

The National City Bank of New York has just issued a statement telling of improved conditions in the country, particularly in connection with the market for farm products which will very greatly add to the purchasing power of the nation. Merchants and manufacturers have already taken heart and are responding to the change and this in the month of July when business is usually very quiet.

August, it is expected, will show a still greater improvement and pretty soon employment will become general.

We predict that the usual conditions will be reversed this winter. Instead of employment becoming scarcer as the cold weather comes on, there will probably be more employment in December than there was in July. It is impossible to stop a recovery movement of this kind just as it was impossible to stop the crash which brought on the trouble.
