HON. JOHN HART SUES CITY FOR DAMAGES

Hon. John Hart has brought a Supreme Court action against the city of Victoria for \$2,400 damages to compensate him for the loss of his wife's touring car, which he claims was ruined for all time when it was struck on the early morning of February 3 by Deputy Fire Chief Munro's car.

Mr. Hart was driving the car at the time it was smashed. He claims that Chief Stewart was driving at an excessive rate of speed, failing to sound the siren, and also neglected to have non-skid chains put on the tires, as he should have done with the ground as wet as it was. Mr. Hart contends that his car was damaged beyond repair.

Deputy Chief Munro was driving to a fire at St. Joseph's hospital when the accident occurred. It is stated that he applied the brakes as soon as he saw Mr. Hart's car, but that his own machine skidded around and the rear end struck the Finance Minister's car with terrific force.

WATER NOTICE

USE AND STORAGE

TAKE NOTICE that Pacific Coast Exploration Co., Ltd., whose address is Toronto, Ont., will apply for a licence to take and use 200 cubic feet per second and to store 4,000 acre feet or 174,240,000 cubic feet of water out of Cascade and Silver Creeks (streams), also known as draining Long Lake and other small lakes in the vicinity of the Big Missouri Group, which flows in a southwesterly direction and drains into the Salmon River about one mile south of the International Boundary Line.

The storage-dam will be located at Long Lake and other small lakes adjacent.
