SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where 1 -emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in ess than 5 years, with improvements of 10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at

by one person or company. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the privilege is also made retroactive. TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agree-ments to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, cover in proportion to the sale price of holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a propor-tionate allotment jointly.
