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

Six-Hour Day Would Shut Down Industries.

That the six-hour day is indissolubly bound up with the one big union movement, and that the six-hour day would eliminate profit and therefore put employers out of business was admitted by Jack Kavanagh in the Westholme Theatre last night. While |* he pretended that the idea of the six hour day was to prevent riot |* and bloodshed he must have known, and we believe he did know, that its institution would tend to bring about just what he professed to wish to prevent.

Mr. Kavanagh suggested that the time for any radical change of policy such as communism was not yet ripe, yet he knew well |* and practically admitted that the six-hour day would put out of business almost every industry in the province.

If British Columbia provided her own food it would not be so bad. She could feed herself under any circumstances. Very little of the food is produced here, however. What we produce is lumber and other wood products, minerals, fish, and agricultural products. Of these the first three are chiefly for export and with the money so earned we import food and clothing and luxuries.

Bring in the six-hour day and the mines will close, the mills will shut down, the cold storage plants and pulp mills will cease their activities and practically every industry in the country will go out of business. Mr. Kavanagh pictured a time during the coming autumn when men would be out of employment and there would be bread lines, composed largely of returned soldiers. He did not seem to remember that as soon as France and Belgium begin to receive indemnity they will be buying from us large quantities of lumber and other products, that minerals will be in demand there, and that our fish food will be welcomed in many parts of the world.


What is needed just now is not to put a crimp in industries, but for all to work together to try to stimulate them. Let us build up the industries of our own province. Reducing the hours of working here will make no appreciable difference to the production of the world. If we simply produced our own food there might be something in the argument for a six-hour day, but as we of Thomas McManamon produce to sell to other countries, and with the money obtained from those products we buy food and other things we need, the more we produce, the more luxuries we can buy. We must con- you sider ourselves in relation with our neighbors.

Jack Kavanagh is a pleasant speaker. He knows how to appeal to his audience and he is more courteous and careful in the choice of expression than the ordinary demagogue. Probably he believes that he is steering the workingmen along right lines. He is well posted in his subject and was in a position to answer questions put to him. He is a socialist but has found that it is easier to go after what he wants in a circuitous manner than to get after it direct. He did not omit the opportunity to get after the "capitalist press," which is only the natural thing for him to do. The newspapers are fair game for everyone to kick at. It is the fashion now to blame the capitalistic press when anything is published which does not please the reader.
