ANNUAL MEETING OF CANADIAN BAR ASS'N.
Elihu Root and Lord Findlay Have Been Invited to Attend.

 Toronto, April 30.—Arrangements for the annual meeting of the Canadian Bar Association in Winnipeg on August 27 to 29 next were partially completed at the general meeting of the council at Toronto yesterday. Representatives were present from nearly all provinces. Lord Findlay of the English bar and Elihu Root of the United States bar, have been invited to the Winnipeg gathering.

KAISER INSTIGATOR OF CRIMES SAYS PAPER

 London, April 30.—The Evening Standard claims it has the highest authority for asserting that William Hohenzollern will be prosecuted and tried, not as an originator of the war, but as one of the instigators of crimes, as provided in the report of the commission on war responsibility.

STREET RAILWAYMEN MAY GO ON STRIKE
 Winnipeg, April 30.—The street railwaymen will take a strike vote today unless the "big difference of opinion" now existing between the company and union is settled beforehand. A conference between the men and company was held yesterday.

UKRAINIAN PRELATE MAY BE DEPORTED
 Winnipeg, April 30.—Bishop Budka, prelate of the Ukrainian Church in Canada will appear before the Alien Investigation Board here Monday, and will be asked to show cause why he should not be deported as an undesirable alien enemy.

MUNICH SURROUNDED
 Berlin, April 30.—Bavarian troops with fifteen thousand Prussians crossed the Danube to march on Munich. A later dispatch declares the city is surrounded.

FORTY WERE KILLED IN SEVERE EARTHQUAKE
 Washington, April 30.—Forty persons were killed, many injured and much property damage caused by a severe earthquake in San Salvador yesterday, the State Department is advised. Slight shocks occurred at intervals during the day.
WANT ORDERS FOR RAILS
 Ottawa, April 29.—Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, was waited upon yesterday by a delegation from Sault Ste. Marie, which urged the desirability of orders for steel rails being given to the steel plant at that place.
DAYLIGHT SAVING DEAD
 Winnipeg, April 29.—Daylight saving is dead in Winnipeg for this year. It was finally rejected by the City Council last night by a vote of eight to five.
