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## PREPARING TO RECEIVE THE AUSTRIAN PEACE DELEGATES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, May 3.—Preparations were begun at St. Germain today for the reception of the Austrian peace delegates. Although no date has been set for the arrival, this activity indicates they will arrive before the German delegation leaves for Versailles. St. Germain is located on the Seine, seven miles north of Versailles and ten miles northwest of Paris.

According to recent information separate treaties with Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria are to be taken up in succession immediately after the Germans receive the terms of the pact they signed.

## MILITARISM BROKEN SAYS HINDENBURG

Berlin, May 3.—"German militarism is broken forever," is a statement attributed to Field Marshal von Hindenburg, the reason of whose resignation have been received here. General Hindenburg, former head of the department of munitions, who is now field marshal's chief of staff, is mentioned as his chief successor, according to news received from Kolberg.

## ARRESTED FOR HOUSE BREAKING

## GERMAN WAR SHIPS NOT TO SINK

Paris, May 2.—The naval terms stipulated in the peace treaty with Germany do not provide for the sinking of the larger German warships. Disposition of the vessels will be made later by the Allied powers.

## LECTURE TOMORROW IN WESTHOLME THEATRE

R. Crowe-Swords to Speak on  
"The Alien Enemy and the  
Returned Soldier."

R. Crowe-Swords, returned soldier, and late industrial adviser under the Military Service Act, will be the speaker at the Westholme Theatre at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon.

By special request Mr. Crowe-Swords will deal extensively with the alien question and by reason of his former official position, is considered an authority on this subject.

He will also deal with the atrocities committed by the Germans, going into this subject fully. French life will also be touched upon, of which Mr. Crowe-Swords tells many amusing incidents, which keep his audience in laughter.

Over one hundred and fifty British and Canadian official pictures of the front line and other scenes will be shown on the screen, including a series of humorous slides by Captain Bruce Bairnsfather, as well as pictures showing what is being done by the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment in the re-educating of disabled soldiers.

A lecture such as this promises to be, should interest all citizens of Prince Rupert, being not only entertaining but educational. Mr. Crowe-Swords is said by all who have heard him at various points to be an exceptionally fine speaker. He is also a veteran of the South African war, where he served with both the Canadian and Imperial forces.

## WORST STORM ON PRAIRIES EVER KNOWN

## DEFUSE DEMAND BUT CONSIDER REQUEST TO SECURE EX-KAISER

London, May 3.—It is now stated that the Dutch hold that the former Emperor of Germany cannot be extradited for trial by the Allied Entente. They will refuse a demand for his deliverance of the ex-Kaiser, but will consider a polite request.

## GILL NET LICENSES FOR RETURNED MEN

Allotment of Licenses in Northern  
Waters Shows a Percentage  
for Soldiers.

Fresh from Ottawa, full of schemes for his department, Lt.-Col. F. H. Cunningham, chief inspector of fisheries in British Columbia for the federal government, has arrived back, says the Vancouver Sun.

Inspector Cunningham states that although many matters were discussed with the acting minister, everything is still before the minister who only returned to his office yesterday after a lengthy illness, consequently any business done will have to receive the approval of the minister before it becomes effective.

One matter, however, was settled, and that was the question of issuing fish licenses with the object of caring for the returned soldier, at the same time not losing sight of the fact that there is a necessity for conservation.

In district No. 2 comprising that area of the northern waters between Smith's Inlet and the boundary line on Portland Canal including the Queen Charlotte Islands, there is a limitation on boats engaged in gill net fishing, as follows: Rivers Inlet, 700; Skeena River, 850; Naas River, 275; Smiths Inlet, 115; Bella Coola, 100; Dean Channel, 80; Namu, 40, and Butedale, 60. On Rivers Inlet, Smith Inlet, Bella Coola, Dean Channel and Butedale a 30 per cent. allotment has been reserved for returned soldiers up to June 1. On the Naas 20 per cent, Namu 20 per cent and Skeena 15 per cent. This totals up about 500 gill net licenses reserved for soldiers. When the full complement has been made up of boats on any area any privileges for additional licenses have been reserved for soldiers only.

In the matter of seining licenses of which it is understood there are over 100 applications by soldiers, the inspector stated that although that matter had been discussed nothing definite was done until the minister returns to office, but Mr. Cunningham expects to hear any day now of the government's decision in this matter, together with other important questions discussed while he was at the capital.

A Chinaman by the name of Gee Dew, appeared before Magistrate McMullin this morning in the police court charged with having opium in his possession to the value of \$60. He was fined \$25 and the opium confiscated.

## BEER SOLD IS MUCH ABOVE TWO AND HALF

Report to the Police Commission  
Shows That of Twenty Samples  
All Were Above Legal  
Percentage.

If the police undertake to prosecute all who have been selling beer and cider in contravention of the Prohibition Act, all the grocery stores, the hotels, the pool rooms, bars and peanut stands and wholesalers in the city will have to pay fines into the civic exchequer. According to a report made to the police commission yesterday all the samples which have been analyzed, numbering about twenty in all, were above the two and a half per cent allowed by law, and the end is not yet. One sample of cider went as high as nine per cent. Beer contained over seven per cent alcohol, and no sample contained less than 2.9 per cent.

Much of the beer was of standard brewing, coming from well known breweries. It was properly labelled and bottles in many cases were sealed. In others there was neither name nor label and bottles were simply corked.

In the discussion that followed the report, it was shown that both wholesalers and retailers were probably innocent of any offence in most cases. In other cases warnings had been given that drinks being sold were not within the legal requirements. It was suggested that it was the duty of the Government to test the beer before it was sent from the breweries in order to protect the innocent dealers. If the stuff was certified it would protect the dealer and make the work of enforcement easier.

The police commissioners decided to take legal advice before commencing prosecutions under the Act. This will be done immediately and a course of action decided upon.
