## "BETTER 'OLE" SIMPLY GREAT

The Real Trench Life as Seen by  
Bairnsfather Wonderful in  
Detail and True to  
Type.

It is so difficult to describe  
"The Better 'Ole," the picture  
that was shown last night at the  
Westholme Theatre, that anyone  
who has not seen it is at a loss  
to understand the enthusiasm of  
those who have.

The picture is British, and it  
deals with the adventures mostly  
in the trenches, of three British  
soldiers, the brain creations of  
the great cartoon artist, Bairns-  
father. The lighter side of trench  
life, the humors of the British  
soldier, and the bits of sadness  
are closely interspersed through-  
out. The humor is sometimes  
rather deep, but it is the one  
thing that kept the British sane  
and won the war.

Many good pictures come to  
Prince Rupert but none has been  
here yet that can compare with  
this wonderful production. The  
periods of duty and the rest  
periods between are so well shown  
that the audience feels as if it  
were transported to the fighting  
lines and made to take part in the  
dancing, the jokes and the heart-  
aches.

"The Better 'Ole" is not spec-  
tacular. There is nothing grue-  
some about it. There is little  
firing of guns and no charging  
the enemy. It deals with the more  
minute and intimate phases of  
the life of the British Tommy.  
It connects up the life of the  
people at home with the life of  
the men at the front such as has  
never been done before. After  
seeing the picture one feels that  
he knows more of the life of the  
soldier than he ever could have  
known in any other way. This  
is the one picture that should  
not be missed. It is to be shown  
again tonight at the Westholme.

WATER ACT, 1914.

RIPARIAN RIGHTS

NOTICE is hereby given that under the  
provisions of Section 6 of the Water Act,  
1914, every riparian proprietor claiming  
any right to divert water or to the ex-  
clusive use of water for any purpose by  
virtue only of his being such riparian pro-  
prietor is required on or before the first  
day of June, 1920, to file a statement of  
claim setting forth the particulars of his  
claim. Such statements of claim shall be  
filed in duplicate with the Water Recorder  
of the Water District in which the water  
is diverted or used.

After the first day of June, 1920, no  
right to divert water or to the exclusive  
use of water for any purpose shall exist  
by virtue only of any ownership of land.  
Forms of statement of claim can be ob-  
tained from the Water Recorder of the  
District in which the water is diverted or  
used, or from the Comptroller of Water Rights,  
Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B. C.

of March, 1919.

## PACKERS FIX PRICE OF SPRING SALMON

Astoria, Ore., May 5.—Eleven  
and one-quarter cents a pound to  
fishermen for Royal Chinook sal-

season, when it was set by the  
Federal Food Administration.
