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## ARMIES TO ADVANCE IF GERMANS REFUSE TO ACCEPT PEACE TERMS; AUSTRIAN TREATY ALMOST READY

Peace may be Dictated from Berlin; Austrian Boundaries are Defined and Treaty to be complete by end of week; German Plan for League of Nations presented to Council of Four.

Paris, May 13.—It is possible that the armies of the Allies may yet march into Berlin and dictate the terms of peace from there. Undoubtedly an attempt is being made to rouse the Germans against accepting the peace terms which are offered. If the terms are refused nothing but military occupation will bring the people to a realization that they are not really the winners of the war but the losers, and that they must be prevented from ever again attempting to impose their will on the rest of the world.

London, May 13.—Reuters learns that in the event of Germany not signing the Peace Treaty, which is regarded as unlikely, all military arrangements have been made for the Allied armies to advance in exactly the same way they would have done had Germany not accepted the armistice terms.

Paris, May 13.—The Council of Four spent the greater part of the day on the Austrian boundaries and completed the task of defining them, in session with the Foreign Minister.

The Austrian treaty will be completed by the end of the week. The German delegates waited on the Council of Four and presented the German plan for the League of Nations. The principal feature of this is the formation of an international parliament composed of representatives of each nation.

### NO IMMIGRATION IS BEING ENCOURAGED

London, May 13.—With the exception of farm laborers and domestic servants no immigration will be accepted by the Canadian Immigration Commission here until autumn, and immigration of any kind is not being encouraged before next spring.

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## "BARODA" LOST DECK CARGO

Hulk Towed by Steamer "Anyox"  
Puts Into Port in Distress  
On Way to Seward.

With a list to port, on account of the shifting of her cargo, the British hulk Baroda is anchored in the harbor this morning. The hulk was in tow of the steamer Anyox belonging to the American Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co. and carried some four thousand tons of railroad cars which were being taken from Panama to Seward for the Alaskan Engineering Commission.

The tow was some four weeks out from Balboa, Panama, and when about a hundred miles west of Cape St. James the southernmost point of the Queen Charlotte Islands, encountered heavy weather, which caused the cargo to shift. Five of the cars went overboard, carrying away some fifty feet of the bulwarks. The Prince Rupert Stevedoring Co. will re-stow the deck load and the necessary repairs will be carried out by the drydock company before the hulk is towed north.

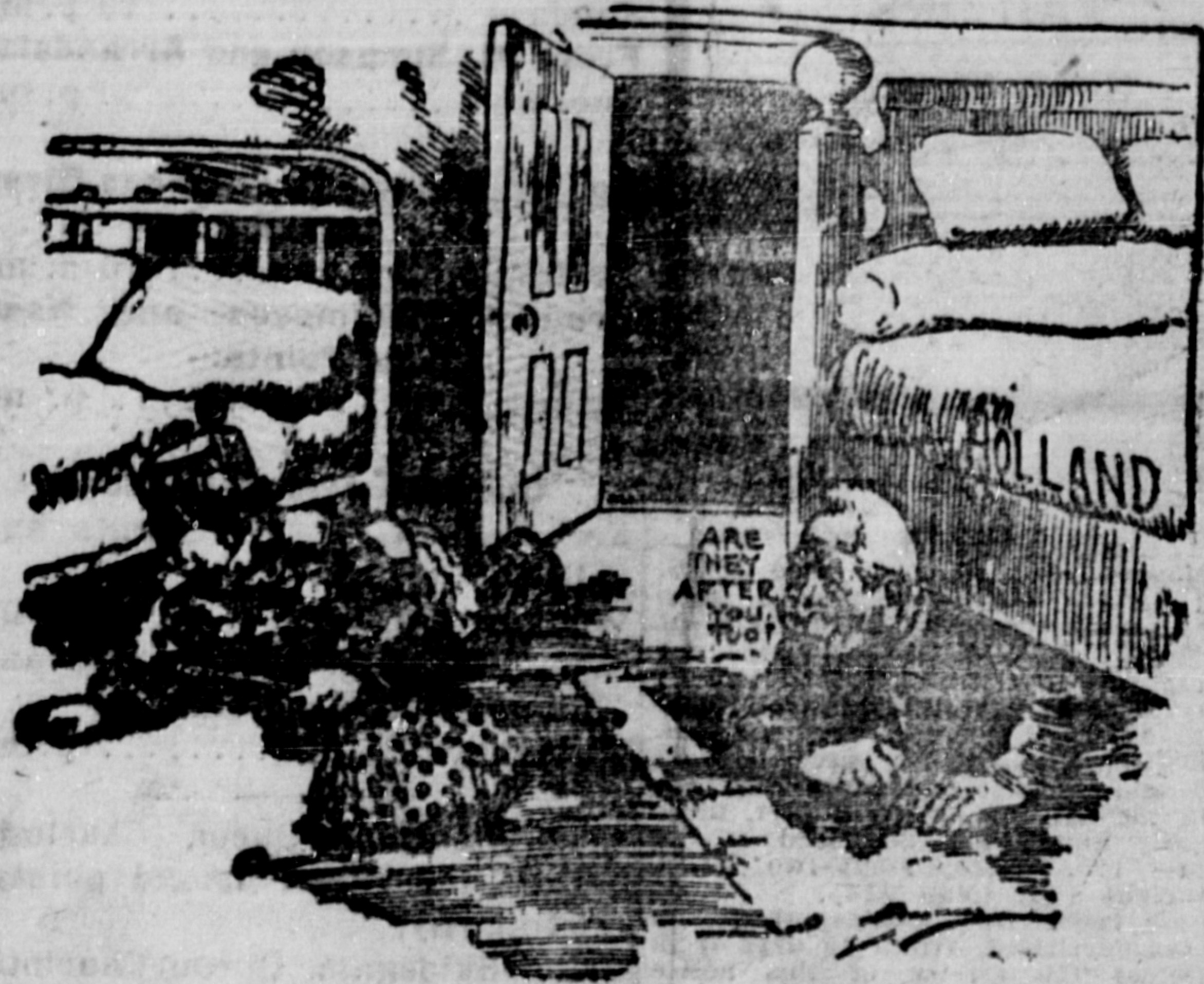

## DUKES OPPOSE TAKING AWAY COAL ROYALTIES

Duke of Northumberland Gets  
Over Quarter of Million a  
Year Income From  
That Source.

London, May 13.—The Dukes with incomes largely drawn from mining royalties put up a spirited fight at a meeting of the Coal Commission on the question of nationalization of the mines.

The Duke of Northumberland owns 250,000 acres of land with proved mineral rights and admitted that his average annual income from royalties was \$270,000. He declared, however, that the state collected three quarters of the value of the mineral in taxation.

## SASKATCHEWAN IS OUTWARDLY QUIET IN INDUSTRIAL SENSE

Moose Jaw, May 12.—Saskatchewan has now been covered by the Industrial Relations Commission. Outwardly and in specific conditions, Saskatchewan is more quiet than Alberta and idyllically placid compared with British Columbia. There is practically no unemployment in any of the three cities visited, Saskatoon, Regina or Moose Jaw, and only one real strike was brought to the Commission's attention.

## HAYSPORT NO. 2 LOSES HER RUDDER IN STORM

The fishing schooner Haysport No. 2, which went out to the fishing grounds last Tuesday, returned yesterday minus a rudder, after being out about four days. She encountered some very rough weather in the Hecate Straits just after commencing to fish, and during the storm was unfortunate enough to lose her rudder, which, of course, forced her to turn back with only 3,000 pounds of fish. She is gone into drydock which will delay her two or three days.

### KEMP IS HOME

## SOLDIER SETTLEMENT AND CIVIL SERVICE ACT TO BE PASSED DURING SESSION

WESTERN MEMBERS ASK FOR INCREASE IN MOUNTED  
POLICE FORCE—ONE MORE COUNTY COURT  
JUDGE FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA TO  
BE PROVIDED FOR

Ottawa, May 13.—The introduction by Hon. Arthur Meighen, Minister of the Interior, of the Soldier Settlement Bill, and the definite assurance by Hon. A. K. MacLean that the bill to amend the Civil Service Act will be introduced and put through this session, were features of the afternoon sitting of the House of Commons. Mr. MacLean emphasized the enormous labor involved in the act reclassifying 50,000 employees. The legislation and schedules make six or seven hundred printed pages.

### Mounted Police.

During the consideration of the North West Mounted Police estimates, western members pressed for a considerable increase in the force and expressed a fear that there may be developments which will call for a larger body of mounted men than now exists.

The House went into the resolution to amend the Judges Act to provide for the salary of an additional judge of the County Court of British Columbia at \$3,000 per annum.

### Drafted Men.

The Minister of Militia stated that 47,509 drafted men actually went overseas. The number also who volunteered for service after the Military Service Act was passed, other than class one men who came under the provisions of the Act was 29,007.

## COAL ONCE MORE IS BURNING QUESTION

Alderman Perry Wants to Know  
If the Fuel Commission Has  
Cold Feet.

Tenders for the supply of 35 tons of coal were received by the City Council and referred to the Finance Committee. The tenders were as follows: Peter Black, Alberta mine run, \$8.25; lump, \$9.50; Wellington, \$11.70. Albert & McCaffery, Yellowhead, \$9, f.o.b. wharf.

The submission of these tenders brought up the whole question of coal supply once more.

Where is the fuel board? inquired Alderman Perry. Is not this a matter for it? (To the mayor) I was wondering if the board had taken cold feet after being turned down.

Alderman Casey said he did not think the board had any power. The Council should declare itself on the matter of securing a season's supply.

Alderman McRae thought this a matter that properly belonged to the fuel commission.

Aldermen Currie and Rochester both advocated calling for tenders for the coal delivered at certain times as directed.

### ARRIVED SATURDAY

Trepassey, Nfld., May 13.—The arrival on Saturday of the big seaplanes N.C. 1 and N.C. 3 were declared after inspection to have been uninjured by the long trip from Rockaway Beach, N.Y. The official report to the Navy Department said the N.C. 1 covered the distance of 460 miles from Halifax in six hours and 56 minutes. The average speed was nearly 70 miles an hour.
