CONTRAST IN WELCOMES

Editor The News,

While no returned soldier grudges the honor paid to Colonel Peck, V. C., and Capt. McGregor, V. C., or that fitting welcome should be given to the 16th Canadian Scottish, the contrast between their welcome and that given to Prince Rupert long service men is so great that these men are beginning to wonder if they had a nightmare in believing they had helped to win the war.

The great majority of the soldiers now coming back believe that Prince Rupert has the coldest welcome of any place from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Halifax, with boatload after boatload passing through offers refreshment and the glad hand to every man, as does every city and stopping place on the way to the coast.

Though Prince Rupert abounds in platform patriots and patriotic organizations who say there is nothing too good for the returned men, the fact is not apparent when the boys come home, however much they were loved when absence made the heart grow fonder. Men passing on to up-river points go on without a smile or a "how do you do," which even from a business point of view is poor policy. One Terrace man with his discharge certificate in his pocket could not cash a cheque until he could be identified by a local businessman, and being a stranger was up against it until two fellow soldiers vouched for him.

At the gathering on Sunday night the reception of the local returned men was absolutely contemptible, although they were advertised as sharing in the civic welcome. Very few of them even had a seat at all, let alone sharing in the smiles of Prince Rupert's lovely ladies so beamingly bountiful on the killed lads of Vancouver and Victoria. They had no chance to form part of the procession from the wharf, which was no great kick, as Captain McGregor, V. C., was also a forgotten factor until a returned man ushered him into an auto.

The city fathers would be well advised to save the stamps on mailing the illuminated address, as a number are likely to be returned with or without thanks.

Neither Colonel Peck nor Captain McGregor, splendid soldiers and true gentlemen, would endorse the city's attitude to its returned men.

SPACE ALLOTTED IN EXHIBITION BUILDING

**Alderman Perry Says Commercial



WATER ACT, 1914. RIPARIAN RIGHTS

NOTICE is hereby given that under the provisions of Section 6 of the Water Act, 1914, every riparian proprietor claiming any right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose by virtue only of his being such riparian proprietor is required on or before the first day of June, 1920, to file a statement of claim setting forth the particulars of his claim.
