SIR BARTON WON KENTUCKY DERBY

More Than 50,000 People Witnessed Great Event in Racing World.

Louisville, Ky., May 12.—Sir Barton, by Star Shot, from Lady Sterling, a colt owned by commander J. K. L. Ross of Montreal, won the 45th renewal Kentucky Derby over a muddy track, winning \$20,825 and enriched the public to the extent of \$7.20 for a mutual ticket. Billy Kelly from the same stable, with E. Salde up, came second by a length, P. Dunne's imported colt, Under Fire, was third. The time was 2:09 4-5 for the mile and a quarter, 6 2-5 seconds slower than the Derby record.

More than 50,000 persons, the largest Kentucky Derby Day in history, were present.
