REAL AND THEORETICAL COMMUNISM

The paradox of the effect of Russian propaganda throughout the earth is that it is creating ideas and conceptions the antithesis of those which are enforced in the Soviet realm, says the Victoria Colonist editorially. Communism outside Russia believes in laziness and agitation, in short hours and the receipt of something for nothing, with the state the universal provider. In Russia the official formula is that he who works more shall eat more, buy more, enjoy more. That is a doctrine which could never appeal to the Communist agitators in other lands. Their belief is that he who works hard and makes a success of his life is a parasite on the proletarian body politic.

The fact is that Communistic propaganda has so warped the conception of life's values that its most active protagonists seem to have lost the desire, the will and the ability to work and to give their quid pro quo for what life has to offer. The very contrary conception of what Communism means is being enforced to the point of slavery in Russia, and that perhaps explains why none of the converts to Communism in other lands are willing to go to Russia to take their chance in the paradise of their political conceptions.

FOOTBALL MEETING

Gilhuly Cup Knock-Out Series Decided on—Will Stage Soccer Tournery During Fair

The Prince Rupert Football Association, at an executive meeting last evening, decided to operate the Gilhuly Cup series of games this season on a knock-out basis, the following draw being made by the president:

August 18—Merchants vs. Canadian Legion.

August 23—Home Oil vs. Regiment.

There will be no overtime, the games to be replayed if the issue is not settled at full time.

The final, if possible, will be played on August 30, the opening night of the Prince Rupert Exhibition.

Arrangements are being made for a game between Canadian Legion of the City League and H. M. C. S. Skeena on Saturday evening of this week.

The football executive also decided to conduct a football tournament in conjunction with the Prince Rupert Exhibition this year. It will take the form of a five-a-side competition which will be open to all football enthusiasts regardless of whether or not they are registered players. The entry fee will be \$1 for each team of five players and entries are to be in not later than August 31. It is planned to hold the qualifying rounds on September 1 and the final on September 2. On the Friday night there will also be a place kicking competition and a dribbling race.

Merchants Win Thrilling Soccer Game From Canadian Legion and Cinch Stuart Shield For Season

In what was probably the most thrilling soccer match that has been seen here this season, Merchants, after having been down two to nil in the early stages of the game, came up from behind last evening to defeat the Canadian Legion by a score of 3 to 2 and cinch the Stuart Benefit Shield football trophy for the 1932 season. While there are two games still scheduled to be played in the series, they will have no bearing on the possession of the trophy for the year. A good-sized crowd of fans witnessed last night's match all of whom derived a great kick from the keenness of the play and the climactic finish.

Canadian Legion was fortunate to go one goal ahead within the first minute of play through a penalty kick after George Mitchell of the Merchants had handled, Horne scoring on the penalty. Ten minutes later Johnson scored the second goal for the Legion after Vic Menzie had miskicked in front of the goal. These early reverses only served to spur the Merchants on and they attacked almost continuously. Henry Dickens scored the first for the Merchants following a rebound from a terrific shot by Albert Dickens. The score at half time was two to one in favor of the Legion.

Second Half

Immediately on resumption of play for the second half, Comadina got away on the left wing and equalized for the Merchants following a scrimmage. The Merchants continued to bombard the Legion goal but Gurvich was playing a good game and seemed almost unbeatable. Ten minutes from time Hunt handled the ball in the penalty area and Comadina took the kick but Gurvich saved. Three minutes later the Merchants got another penalty kick after Hunt had handled deliberately. Albert Dickens took the kick and made no mistakes in scoring, putting Merchants one up and giving them the trophy. The Legion tried hard to equalize but the Merchants' defence was sound.

For the Merchants Webster, Geo. Hills, Dickens, MacKay and Chenoski starred. For the Canadian Legion Gurvich, Horne Currie and Hadden were best.
