PRESIDENT OF LABOR COUNCIL RESIGNATION

Committee Appointed to Work out
One Big Union—Appreciation
of Local Lawyer.

Because he is likely to be hiring labor during the coming season, W. E. Thompson resigned his position as president of the Trades and Labor Council at its meeting Wednesday evening. The resignation was accepted with regret.

Mr. Thompson explained his position and said that owing to the action of a certain faction in the labor ranks action had been taken by him earlier than it otherwise might have been. As an example of what he referred to he cited the recent visit of Jack Kavanagh to this city recently. The meeting had been arranged without any reference to him. He was now stepping down to make room for the "progressives" who while the hardest battles for labor had been fought had been conspicuous by their absence.

Expressed Regret.

Regrets were expressed by S. D. Macdonald, L. Dawson and Sid Cox, all of whom spoke of the good work the president had done, never sparing himself and always working in what he believed to be the best interests of labor.

The question of building a labor temple in the city was discussed and progress reported, the committee giving an estimate for the work at something like \$10,000.

The question whether it was right for the president of the Trades and Labor Council to accept an invitation to go to meet Colonel Peck was discussed. President Thompson told of having gone with the party of citizens on Sunday. He felt he had been correct in doing so because Col. Peck's attitude at Ottawa had been fair and square.

Delegate Casey took some exception to the attitude of the president especially to his having been influenced by the tone of letters received from Ottawa.

No Apologies.

S. D. Macdonald did not consider the president had any apologies to offer for Colonel Peck was a gallant and distinguished soldier. It was creditable to everyone to unite in doing honor to a man who had won such renown. A motion to endorse the action of the president passed without dissent.

G. B. Casey, Lester Dawson, R. T. J. Rose, George Rudderham and J. Pilford were appointed a committee to draft a platform in conformation with the principles of the One Big Union, it being reported by George Casey that it was likely to carry by a large majority.

An appreciation of the work of Alex. Manson, M. P., in defending two loggers who had gone to Queen Charlotte Islands to work and had found the camp closed and then returned here without a ticket was expressed by some of the delegates, it being mentioned that this was not the first time that Mr. Manson had vigorously and successfully defended laboring men.

PRESENTATION TO MR. AND MRS. MOORE

A presentation was made last evening at the Inlander Boarding House to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Moore by the friends of Mr. Moore who board there.

J. G. Scott was spokesman for the party and he mentioned the high esteem in which Mr. Moore was held by his messmates, and on their behalf made the presentation of a fine chest of silverware.

Mr. Moore made a fitting reply thanking them all on behalf of himself and wife for the valuable present. Mr. and Mrs. Moore are living at the Inlander temporarily.

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land—but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a

maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:—

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.

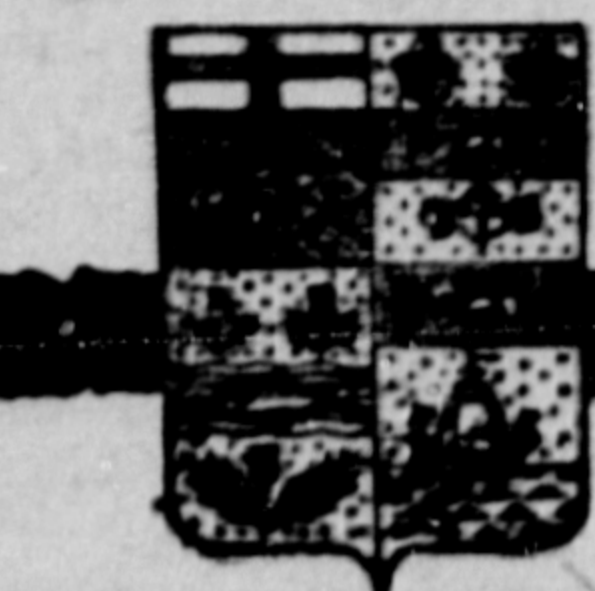
