## The Fight Is the Thing.

Nearly all boys like to read of the wonderful Richard, Coeur de Lion, who loved a good antagonist much more than a peaceful friend. They also like tales of adventure in which there are fights with grizzly bears, with Indians or between parties of whites. As they get older they still like to read of Jess Willard or Jack Johnson.

In the earlier stages of the development of the race men fought for existence, women fought to protect their children. People such as Quakers, who object to fighting, are keen on the industrial struggle which crowds some to the wall and is really a fight for the survival of the fittest.

Labor leaders enjoy their fight among themselves or they set the men at variance with their employers and try to accentuate the class distinction and to make war between them.

## Letter Writing is A Useful Art.

To write a good letter is one of the most useful arts. People who talk well often cannot write a readable letter. Some people whose business it is to write, find letter-writing difficult and the letters they write show that they are anything but artists along that line. Letter writing is different from any other kind of writing.

The person who writes of the weather and of his friends and acquaintances and social activities without illuminating them and entertaining the reader, has failed as a letter writer. There are not many people who are able to write well. Those who have friends who can do it should cultivate them for they are a constant source of delight.

## Paper Manufacture By Japanese.

The manufacture of paper has been carried on in Japan for many centuries. The product now generally known as Japanese paper was described by the early Dutch traders nearly 250 years ago. This product has served all the uses to which we put paper—book printing, covering for doors and partitions, writing and wrapping—and, in addition, has been utilized by the Japanese as a substitute for string, cloth, oilcloth, leather, and even wood, iron and glass. Its excellent lasting qualities and its superiority over machine-made papers have led to its utilization for a number of purposes for which foreign paper would be unsuitable. These advantages are due to the fact that in making this paper the Japanese use the tough and pliant inner bark from three or four species of deciduous trees, possessing long, tough fiber cells and this bark is not cut or hacked in transforming it into pulp, but is separated by pounding and beating, so that the long cells remain unbroken.

In the manufacture of this paper the form is held so that the parallel splinters or threads run from left to right. The form is then lifted and lowered at right angles to this direction, causing the fibers of the material to lie in one direction. Japanese paper is consequently torn easily one way, but with difficulty the other. There is no special sizing or glazing, but each sheet has a rough and smooth side, resulting from the process of drying. The shaped sheets are pasted with a large brush on a smooth planed board to dry, and the side against the board remains much smoother than the outside surface. The smooth side is used for book printing and the two rough sides are folded against each other in binding the book, so that Japanese books consist of double sheets of thin paper.

All Japanese paper is very porous, and consequently can not be written on with pen and ink, although it is well adapted to the Japanese mode of writing with brush and India ink. Smooth, firm, machine-made paper would not absorb this ink so well, and as therefore not in demand. There is no process of bleaching, and all Japanese paper is of a yellow tint, although sometimes whitened by the ingredients used to soften it in manufacture.

## LAND REGISTRY ACT.

## WATER ACT, 1914.

RIPARIAN RIGHTS

NOTICE is hereby given that under the provisions of Section 6 of the Water Act, 1914, every riparian proprietor claiming any right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose by virtue only of his being such riparian proprietor is required on or before the first day of June, 1920, to file a statement of claim setting forth the particulars of his claim. Such statements of claim shall be filed in duplicate with the Water Recorder of the Water District in which the water is diverted or used.

After the first day of June, 1920, no right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose shall exist by virtue only of any ownership of land. Forms of statement of claim can be obtained from the Water Recorder of the several Water Districts in the Province or from the Comptroller of Water Rights, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B. C. 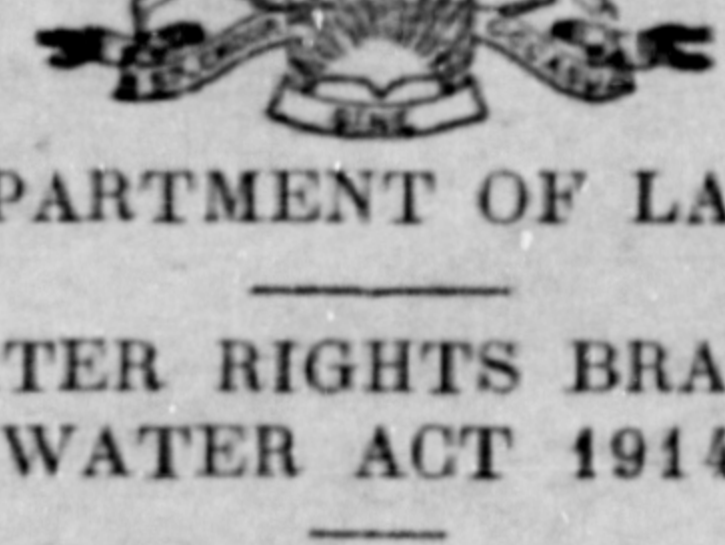
