## GERMAN GOVERNMENT FULLY UNITED AGAINST SIGNING; BERLIN PEOPLE HOSTILE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Berlin, May 19.—A semi-official announcement was made on Thursday that insinuations in the pan-German newspapers were false regarding the intention of the Ebert-Schiedemann Government signing the Allied peace terms. The Government, the announcement says, is fully united on declining to sign the treaty.  
London, May 19.—British officers in Berlin have been ordered to wear civilian clothes out of doors lest they incite the populace to a demonstration.  
The United States couriers in uniform have mostly been forced to remain in the Hotel Adlon, and there is a general feeling in the hotel that there will be trouble within the next few days.

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## CHURCHES ARE OPPOSED TO PRIZE FIGHT

Ministerial Association Asks to Have Dempsey-Willard Bout Prohibited.

Toledo, May 19.—The churches here are taking vigorous action to try to stop the Dempsey-Willard prize fight. Governor Cox, Sheriff James F. Mathison and Mayor Schrieber have been asked by the Ministerial Association, embracing 250 churches to prohibit the bout, preparations for which are now going on.

## LIBERAL PLATFORM

Delegates From Labor and Soldier Organizations Invited to Convention.

A new Liberal platform is to be enunciated embodying the more advanced views of the members of the party and working out in concrete form the Liberal principles as adapted to present day problems. This will be done at the big convention of Liberals which is to be held the first week in August at Ottawa. Other purposes of the meeting will be the matter of party organization and the selection of a leader.

A manifesto calling the convention has been issued by the temporary house leader, D. D. McKenzie, in which the following paragraph is used:

"Owing to changed conditions arising out of the war and to the desirability for co-operation among all ranks of Liberal democracy in dealing with grave national problems, invitations will be extended to the Canadian council of agriculture, the Dominion Trades and Labor Council, the G. W. V. A. and the Canadian railway brotherhoods to send representatives to the convention for the purpose of presenting such views as these national bodies may desire to present prior to the drafting and adoption of a national Liberal platform.

## AUSTRALIAN AVIATOR LEFT LAST NIGHT FOR IRELAND - ENGLISHMAN'S PLANE LOST

St. Johns, Newfoundland, May 19.—The Australian aviator has started on his trans-Atlantic flight, the plane of his English rival has been wrecked, and the United States navy plane N. C. 3 is believed to have been lost at sea, while the N. C. 4 is safe at Ponta, Azores.

Harry G. Hawker, the Australian aviator, and Capt. McKenzie Grieve, his navigator, are winging their way across the Atlantic tonight on the most perilous aeroplane flight in history. They took the air at 5:55 p. m. today, Greenwich time (1:55 New York time) and expect to reach the Irish coast in 20 hours unless some accident forces them to plunge into the sea.

When the Sopwith biplane passed from view beyond the hills to the northeast headed for the open sea, it left behind with shattered hopes Hawker's, the English rival of Frederick Raynham who had hoped to be first across in a Martinsyde plane, to win glory and the \$50,000 prize of the London Daily Mail.

Washington, May 19.—The official naval department announcement tells of the arrival of aeroplane N. C. 4 at Horta, Island of Fayal, Azores, at 8 a. m. Saturday after a 1,200-mile trip in 14 hours and 20 minutes.

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## GARRISON IS UNDER ORDERS FOR WINNIPEG

Toronto Labor Men Declare Soldiers Must Not be Used as Strike Breakers.

Toronto, May 19.—It is understood that a garrison here is under orders to proceed to Winnipeg at a moment's notice.

Labor men here demand that the use of troops during the present unrest be clearly defined and they say if widespread strikes are to be avoided in Canada soldiers must not be used as strike breakers.

## LAND SETTLEMENT BOARD MAKES GOOD

So Says Visitor From the Bulkley Valley Who Lives on the Spot.

"The Land Settlement Board has made good," said R. E. Williams of Smithers this morning when seen by a Daily News representative. "This is the first time the interior country has ever been noticed by a Government. The farmers are being helped to build silos and a creamery is planned for the Bulkley Valley. A number of new settlers are coming in and many cattle were imported last fall through the Provincial Government."

Mr. Williams said that the spring had been rather dry and cool, but the prospects were good and everyone was optimistic in the valley.

## AUSTRIAN INDEMNITY IS SET AT FIVE BILLION GOLD MARKS

AMOUNT IS ONLY ONE TWENTIETH THAT DEMANDED OF GERMANY—ALLIED FORCES LAND AT SMYRNA UNDER DIRECTION OF PEACE CONFERENCE

Paris, May 19.—The indemnity asked of Austria in the treaty with that country which is being prepared here is five billion gold marks. While this is a large sum it is only one-twentieth the amount demanded of Germany.

Smyrna reports the landing of Allied forces and the occupying of all the forts and strategic points. This move was directed by the peace conference to preserve order.

Smyrna is a city of about 200,000 inhabitants and an important fortified seaport in Asia Minor on the Aegean Sea.

London, May 19.—A British fleet is anchored outside the east Prussian port of Memel close to the Russian frontier.

## TREATY WITH AUSTRIA NOT READY YET

Portions of Document Had to be Redrafted Because of Failure of Hungarians.

Paris, May 19.—The Austrian treaty, according to indications today, will not be ready for presentation before the latter part of this week. It is understood that the failure of the Hungarian delegates to arrive and the uncertainty regarding conditions there, caused a considerable re-draft of portions of the document concerning overlapping questions in the former dual monarchy.

## RECOVERED BODY OF DAN M'KENZIE

Yesterday morning the body of Dan McKenzie, fisherman, who was drowned at Anyox on May 10, was recovered after several days' trawling.

John McKenzie, of Vancouver, brother to deceased, arrived by the Prince George and continued the operations for the recovery of his brother's body, which others had been conducting without success. He dragged again over the spot where the accident happened and brought it to the surface. The remains will be taken to Vancouver for burial.

Deceased was a native of Scotland and belonged to Drumbeg, Sutherlandshire.
