### Oriental Question Under Discussion.

The labor speaker at the Westholme Theatre on Sunday said some things which no politician would have dared to say to the workers. He told his hearers that he favored the admission of Orientals to this province under proper conditions. What he was apparently meaning was that as long as there was ignorance and a low standard of living in any country of the globe there could not be complete freedom in any other. No nation can live to itself any more than can any person live to himself. The policy of hedging the country in and picking the immigrants may be all right as a temporary policy, but eventually all nations have to be educated up to the others and their standards of living raised else there can be no true democracy.

To bring about a condition like that mentioned is of course ideal. It is only necessary to travel through Asia to see how immense is the gulf between those countries and ours. Only the visitor to Japan, to China, to India and to Egypt can realize what the problem is. While Japan is further advanced than any of the other countries, judging from appearances, even there the life of the people is crude and in China it is repulsive. The brotherhood of mankind is a nice thing to talk about, and it is possible that there will come a time when nations will be able to deal with each other as equals, but it will be several generations to come and in the meantime there is a vast work to be done.

### Main Objection To Asiatic Races.

The main objection to Orientals in this country is that they work for low wages and live under conditions to which a white man does not care to descend. The tendency is to lower the standard of living and to give employees a whip with which to flay those who show a spirit of independence. This is an unanswerable objection and one which the speaker on Sunday night saw, for he qualified his statement by suggesting that his proposal was only to be considered under proper conditions.

We in British Columbia are on the border line between the Occident and the Orient and the Oriental question is naturally a very important one here. We probably have a duty to perform in educating the races across the ocean and helping to bring them in line with our own standards. To what extent we should sacrifice our own comfort and well-being in carrying out this program is not very clear. All reforms are brought about by sacrifice and there must always in every age be saviors, sometimes individual men or women and sometimes groups of nations.

### Is Prince Rupert A Wicked Town.

The morality of Prince Rupert was mentioned at the City Council meeting last night when Alderman Kirkpatrick brought up the question of the proper enforcement of the Prohibition Act. She charged that the city had a bad reputation. The mayor on the other hand defended the town and intimated that conditions here were not any worse than at other places, probably not so bad.

Both Mrs. Kirkpatrick and the mayor have their backers. In a town like this we are apt to know pretty much everything that goes on, whereas in a big city the bad is hidden from the good and vice versa to a very large extent. We all know that liquor is being sold here in large quantities and there are occasionally drunken men on the street. It is possible that conditions could be improved if an honest attempt were made to do so. On the other hand it is probable that we are not any worse than other places. For those who have not lived in other places within the last two years it is difficult to judge. At any rate it is to be hoped that the laws will be enforced by the proper authorities and that we may not become a by-word among the cities of the coast.

### WATER ACT, 1914.

RIPARIAN RIGHTS.

NOTICE is hereby given that under the provisions of Section 6 of the Water Act, 1914, every riparian proprietor claiming any right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose by virtue only of his being such riparian proprietor is required on or before the first day of June, 1920, to file a statement of claim setting forth the particulars of his claim.
