ADVANCE IN CITY SALARIES

Firemen Get Advance of \$10 Each And Telephone Operators \$5; City Hall New Schedule.

Certain advances in salaries were made by the City Council last night on the recommendations of the various committees. The report of the fire committee recommending an increase of \$10 a month from May 1 was carried without discussion.

The telephone committee recommended that the operators get an increase of \$5 a month and this was adopted. Alderman Kirkpatrick asked some questions regarding the salaries paid and suggested that some were not getting a living wage. The mayor explained that there was a sliding scale running from \$40 a month for beginners up to over \$70 a month and some got as high as \$90.

A recommendation for increases for city hall employees was carried, the salaries to be as follows:— E. D. Johnson, \$275; H. W. Birch, \$165; A. Brooksbank, \$160; W. D. Vance, \$155; E. S. Allistone, \$155; E. A. Woods, \$145; Miss Sullivan, \$140; Miss Verick, \$65; John Exley, \$100.

The report advised giving the janitor \$95, but Alderman Casey said he thought that was not a living wage and in this he was supported by Alderman McMeekin. The original motion was then withdrawn and the report adopted as amended.

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land—but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a

maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.
