REACTIONARY DAY IN STOCK DEALS

BRITISH COLUMBIA GETS GOOD PRICE FOR SECURITIES

Securities Churned Violently But Most of Changes Are Down

Profit Taking Swarmed Through Market at Frequent Intervals and Large Buying Could Not Offset Setbacks—Early Gains Are Not Sustained

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Stocks churned violently in another active session today on the New York Stock Exchange but many of the net changes were on the down side. Profit taking swarmed through the market at frequent intervals and, despite fresh buying in large volume following on these setbacks, the general tone was inclined to be reactionary. After an outburst of early selling gains of from \$1 to \$3 were scored but the market did not hold.

MOVED TO VICTORIA

EXPORTS ARE DOWN

Less Grain Shipped From United States Ports Last Week Than In Week Previous

WASHINGTON, D.C., August 11.—Grain exports from the United States last week amounted to 1,449,000 bushels as compared with 1,007,000 during the previous week and 2,003,000 bushels during the corresponding week last year.

Canadian grain exported from United States ports last week totalled 607,000 bushels as against 535,000 bushels during the previous week.

ATTEMPT FAILURE

Mrs. Bruce Fails to Set Endurance Record For Airplanes, Although Breaking British Mark

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Mrs. Victor Bruce, British aviatrix, failed again today in her attempt to establish a world record for endurance flying when she came down at Felixstowe after almost sixty hours in the air, breaking the British endurance record.

LOCAL MAN IS ROBBED

Summer Home of John Dybhavn at Lake Kathlyn Entered—Two Men Are Fined

Following the breaking and entering of John Dybhavn's summer home at Lake Kathlyn from which a quantity of utensils were taken, William Anderson and Cyril Macdonald, both of Smithers, were apprehended by the provincial police and appeared before the magistrate at Smithers. Anderson was fined \$25, with option of thirty days' imprisonment, while Macdonald was fined \$10, with option of a week's imprisonment. Some of the stolen goods were found in possession of the two men on their arrest.

CHIEF IS RELIEVED

Esquimalt Police Commission Removes Head of Department Following Charges

VICTORIA, Aug. 11.—Chief of Police Demar Hodnett was relieved of his duties as head of the Esquimalt police department by the board of police commissioners last night following a review of evidence submitted to the commission sitting as a court of inquiry supporting charges by beer parlor proprietors that the late chief requested money from them to assist him while on his annual vacation. Constable Pecknold has been appointed chief.

OUTBREAK IN SPAIN

Armed Attack Upon Ministry of War Has Broken Out in Madrid

MADRID, Spain, Aug. 11.—An armed attack upon the Ministry of War, described as a Communist assault and a movement of the Rightist element against the Republican government, has broken out here. Parts of the Army are involved in the outbreak.

PASSING OF DR. FIELDS

Head of Mathematical Faculty at University of Toronto, Dies, At Age of 70

TORONTO, August 11.—Dr. John Charles Fields, head of the mathematical faculty of the University of Toronto and known throughout the world as a great mathematician, died here Tuesday night in his seventieth year.

VANCOUVER IS FULL OF SPURIOUS MONEY

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Aug. 11.—Sir William Nugent told shareholders of the Great Southwestern Railway here that, unless the de Valera Republican government changes its tariff policy, the railway may have to close down.

CHECK UP ON MALONE

Immigration Department at Toronto Endeavoring to Establish Status of Alleged Would-Be Assassin

TORONTO, August 11.—The immigration department for this district has opened an inquiry into the status of Dan Malone who is being held without bail following his arrest by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police on a charge of vagrancy in connection with a purported attempt to assassinate Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, British Secretary for the Dominions and one of the delegates to the Imperial Conference now in session at Ottawa. Malone is declared to be a dangerous Communist.

STAND NOW MODERATED

LEAGUE IS GRATIFIED

Geneva Sees Possible Co-operation in Stimson Statement—Tokyo Resentful

GENEVA, Aug. 11.—The speech on foreign affairs delivered a few days ago in New York by Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson of the United States is being interpreted by League of Nations commentators as a solid basis for cordial and independent co-operation with the League of Nations by the United States.

JULY LOG SCALE UP

Production For This Year to Date, However, Has Not as Yet Come Up to Level of Last Year

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district in July this year totalled 14,584,887 board feet, again showing an increase over the corresponding month last year when 10,120,065 board feet was recorded. For the year to date scalings have reached a total of 38,743,235 board feet as against 42,163,240 board feet in the first seven months of 1931.

Scaling per species in July this year was as follows, figures for July '31 also being given for comparison:

Forest Products

Poles, piling, etc. scaled during July this year amounted to 39,468 lineal feet—of which 31,296 lineal feet was cedar and 8,172 lineal feet hemlock—as compared with 63,235 lineal feet in July 1931, made up of 57,710 lineal feet cedar and 5,525 lineal feet hemlock. Cordwood scaled this July totalled 385 cords as against 11 cords in July 1931 while 2,049 hewn ties—all jackpine—were counted this July as compared with 19,426—4,976 hemlock and 14,450 jackpine—in July 1931.

ASSISTANCE OF CITIES

Ontario May Give Housing Commissions Moratorium and Return City Gas Taxes

TORONTO, August 11.—Assistance to municipalities by a moratorium upon indebtedness of their housing commissions and rebate of gasoline tax contributed by civic departmental vehicles was indicated by Premier Henry to a gathering of Ontario mayors here.

ELEVEN HUNDRED DEAD IN MANCHURIAN FLOODS

HARBIN, Manchuria, Aug. 11.—Eleven hundred persons are reported to have been drowned in floods in the Ulan section near the city on Sangsing on the Sungari River, according to word received here.

Twenty Injured In Subway Fire

Thousands Were Trapped in New York Underground Railway System, Traffic Being Tied Up for Hours

NEW YORK, August 11.—Fire, which trapped thousands in smoke-filled tunnels of the main subway transit line, resulted in injuries to more than a dozen persons and tied up Manhattan traffic for four hours.

Original Backer Of Henry Ford Is Dead in Detroit

DETROIT, Aug. 11.—Albert Strelow, aged 78, Henry Ford's original financial backer and owner of the building which housed the first Ford automobile factory, is dead here.
