It mentions that an officer suffering from occasional epileptic fits was given a pension of \$75 a month, and a private in an exactly similar case got \$10 a month. Th Most pensions are too low and some are so small as to be absolutely useless. When a man has lost part of his power in serving his country in the war he should be recompensed to that extent so that he may start on an even footing with the civilian. on Page 5.
