ARE NO LONGER ABLE TO INTIMIDATE PEOPLE OF WINNIPEG, SAYS CITIZEN

PAPER PUBLISHED IN INTERESTS OF SUFFERING CITIZENS
HAS SCATHING FRONT PAGE EDITORIAL
DEALING WITH CONDITIONS
IN THAT CITY

A copy of "The Winnipeg Citizen," a paper published in the interest of the citizens of the prairie capital during the strike, has just arrived and on its front page in large type is the following:

"The authorities have taken adequate measures to enable you to go about your work and business in safety.

"Workers are returning to their positions. Business houses are opening and the necessities of life are again within the reach of the people.

"The authorities assure you of adequate protection and advise you to go about business as usual.

"The Strike Committee is no longer able to intimidate citizens and prevent them getting the necessities of existence.

"Permission to Live" Cards Go.

"Permission to Live" cards are being removed from bread and milk delivery wagons. The wave of resentment against Bolshevik legends required on these conveyances, "Permitted by Authority of the Strike Committee," has caused the late temporary government at the Labor Temple to order these "yellow tickets" taken off.

I. W. W. Ideals Don't Appeal to White Men.

"The tyranny of the five in control at the Labor Temple deprived us of bread, milk, fire protection, telegraph, telephone, mail and communication with the outside world. Is this your ideal of freedom and democratic government? Our opinions may differ about other problems of the day but we stand united against the I. W. W., Bolshevik and Soviet Government.

"Let Us Settle the One Big Issue."

"Is every individual dispute between employer and employee to continue to disrupt the life of the whole community?

"Fly your flag and let none forget what it stands for!

"As you walk to work 'by permission of the Strike Committee' just think it over."

SEVENTY-FIVE BUSINESSMEN EXPECTED HERE

Board of Trade Excursion From
Vancouver and Victoria
Being Arranged.

A party of seventy-five business and professional men from Vancouver and Victoria are expected to visit Prince Rupert and the interior country during the course of summer. The excursion is being arranged and it is hoped that the city will have the opportunity to greet the visitors and show them what is being done here and what it is intended shall be done. The following letter from the Vancouver Board of Trade in connection with the outing has been received by President McCaffery of the local Board of Trade:

"At the suggestion of the Honorable the Minister of Lands, T. D. Pattullo, this Board in conjunction with the Victoria Board, is endeavoring to arrange a business man's excursion through certain parts of the upper country.

"We have suggested the following itinerary: Vancouver to Prince Rupert, Prince Rupert to Prince George, Prince George to the head of the Pacific Great Eastern and back to Vancouver.

"We are endeavoring to secure at least seventy-five men to take this trip—about fifty from Vancouver and twenty-five from Victoria. We have not yet decided upon the time but will do so shortly. I should like to feel that we have the co-operation of your Board and your citizens in the endeavor we are making to have this trip a success.

"As soon as I am able I will let you know when we purpose arriving in Prince Rupert so that you can make your own arrangements.

ARRESTED HERE; THEFT CHARGED

Implicated in Gambling
House Mixup.

The prisoner was taken back to Prince George this morning in the custody of Chief Stewart. L. W. Patmore also accompanied the party, and will appear for the defence at Prince George.

HALIBUT GOES UP TO FIFTEEN

On Few Select Lots of Fish Sixteen
Cents Was Realized
Yesterday.

Halibut has been gradually increasing in price from the low mark of nine cents a pound until it has in some small select lots been fetching as high as sixteen cents. As a result many boats that have been tied up on account of the low prices are again being operated and the amount of fish offered for sale here will increase accordingly. The average price paid yesterday for number one fish was slightly over fifteen cents. The following were the sales:

The Vienna with 9,000 pounds; Speculator, 10,000, and Norma, 7,000, at 14.9c, and 6c. per lb. to Atlin Fisheries, Ltd.

The Navigator, 3,000; Hoidal, 4,000; Albatross, 12,000, and the Gifford, 6,000, at the same price to Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

The Nuba, 13,000; Navigator, 9,000, and the Tramp, 3,000, at 15.3c, and 6c. to Booth Fisheries, Ltd.

The Kinnum, 2,000 lbs., and the Agnes B., 2,000, at 15.6c, and 6c. and 16c. and 7.2c. to the Royal Fish Co., and the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., respectively.

WONDERFUL FEAT OF ARMS OF CANADIANS OVERSEAS RECOUNTED BY COL. PECK

VERY INTERESTING ADDRESS BEFORE CANADIAN CLUB AT
LUNCH ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON—ASSET
OF BRAVERY, SAYS BISHOP
BUNOZ

The wonderful feats of arms in which the Canadians took part were described by Lieut.-Col. Peck at the Canadian Club lunch on Saturday. His subject was "The War in 1918." After telling very briefly of the conditions which led up to the last campaign, the speaker told of the days when Paris was being shelled and when there had been reverses in the north. Then that great military instinct, General Currie, organized the wire protection in connection with machine gun battalions. The finest Bavarian troops were against them, but the Canadian positions were not attacked. The Germans had a good idea of the stamina of those troops.

In Shock Army.

Then the Canadians were put in Foch's great shock army. The Germans drove to within thirty miles of Paris and this army of Foch's was to the last defence. They were not needed for defence so they were used in the great blow which won the war.

France was in desperate straits. "I have a great admiration for those people. They were kindly and always ready to sacrifice anything to win the war."

The Colonel then told of the splendid work done by Major Gen. Jack Stewart in building light railways and giving the allied forces that mobility which was necessary. This helped a great deal in the final attacks.

Drove Germans.

The speaker told of the blow after blow that was struck, of the great Amiens fight which Ludendorff had said lost the war for the Germans. In that fight one division leap-frogged the other and drove the Germans before them.

How the Canadians broke the Quent line and overcame all difficulties and how the Germans gave up in shoals was told, and of the battle of Cambrai in which the Canadians took part and of the particular work of the Sixteenth in holding a position until the engineers came up with bridges and allowed the troops to pass. These were the strenuous days. After that it was a "perfect gentleman's war." The taking of Valenciennes was the final act in the drama. Few divisions had had a more enviable record than the Canadians.

Black Canadians.

Of the final march into Cologne and of the terror of the inhabitants who were expecting the "Black Canadians." As the Colonel said, "it was a great thing to be pouring through the city, silent, dignified and indifferent to the population. We showed them a great democratic army which had fought to make liberty and civilization safe again."

Judge Young presided and introduced the guest of the day in a neat speech. He also welcomed the representative of the G. W. V. A., Sam Silversides. They regretted that they had been unable to find Capt. McGregor to invite him.

Vote of Thanks.

In moving a vote of thanks to the speaker, Bishop Bunoz said that the Canadian Club in honoring Col. Peck was honoring itself. The Canadians had left an imperishable name in France and Flanders and won for us great glory. They had acquired for Canada an asset of bravery. The Canadians had endeared themselves to the people among whom they had been billeted through
