LIVED LONG ON ISLANDS

Thomas R. Davey of Queen Charlotte City Passes Away

Thomas Rowe Davey, aged 76, for 23 years a resident of the Queen Charlotte Islands where for many years he was engaged in the real estate and conveyancing business as well as being a notary public and former stipendiary magistrate, passed away early Wednesday morning of last week in the Queen Charlotte City Hospital where he had been a patient for about a week following an apoplectic stroke.

The late Mr. Davey, who was a native of Cornwall, Eng., came to the Queen Charlotte Islands from the Kootenay district in 1909. In his younger days, he had travelled extensively visiting, among other lands, Australia and India. Finally he settled in Canada.

Deceased is survived by a widow and son and daughter in England. A brother is John Neville Davey of Los Angeles.

The funeral took place at Queen Charlotte City last Friday afternoon with Rev. R. P. Graham, Anglican Church clergyman of Massett, officiating. The service took place in the Queen Charlotte City Hotel and was attended by practically all the people of Skidegate Inlet with representation from other parts of the islands. Burial took place in the Queen Charlotte City Cemetery.

Yesterday Featured by Another Active Demonstration of Bullishness Despite Profit-Taking

NEW YORK, August 11.—Securities and commodities joined forces in another active demonstration of bullishness on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday.

After soaring \$2 to \$8 per share under leadership of rails, utilities and farm implement issues, the market reacted under profit-taking in the early session. With heavy buying of motors in the closing minutes, prices came back somewhat, closing from \$1 to \$3 under the best prices of the day.
