Prince Rupert's Exports To the United States.

In the supplement to the commerce reports of the United States dealing with the American consulate of Prince Rupert are to be found some very interesting figures. According to that report the exports from this district to the United States for 1917 were valued at \$4,160,324, while for last year they fell to \$2,822,765. The reason for the falling off is not given, but it is assumed that it was caused very largely by the signing of the armistice. Blister copper exports dropped from \$1,259,852 to \$261,620.

The largest value is in the halibut which in 1917 was valued at over two millions, whereas last year it fell to slightly over a million and a half. There were large increases in the value of wood products exported to the United States, but fish, furs and zinc ore dropped off.

There are no figures available yet for any part of this year. There will, however, be a falling off in the total amount and especially in blister copper.

Stewart Has Been Replaced on Map.

Stewart is once more on the map. It has a newspaper. It has become a town once more.

The difference between a town and a village is that the town has a newspaper and the village has none. The Fourth estate adds dignity to the place and raises its status.

When a village is without a paper it lacks one of the chief institutions at which it can grumble and make slighting remarks. It has no safety valve. It has no way of communicating the fact to those at a distance that a new baby has arrived in the community without writing it in a letter; and there is no dignity about that. When the young man marries or the old couple celebrate their golden wedding the account has to be sent to the city paper which unscrupulously cuts down the detail and eliminates the local color.

Stewart has a newspaper and it is not of the village type. It is an indication that the town is prospering and that the head of Portland Canal is about to become very important.

Talking Shop Narrows Outlook.

There is a great tendency everywhere for people to talk shop. They never forget their work. That may or may not be the key to success if success means nothing more than the accumulation of worldly goods, but it tends to narrowness of outlook, a cramped mind, smallness of vision.

When a man gets away from his business the thing is to forget it, enter a new environment and absorb new ideas, broaden out. There is more to life than merely selling and buying. There is much more to life than gathering in dollars. Remember the commandment "Eight hours shalt thou labor and do all that thou hast to do and on the ninth forget it." The same applies to the employer as the employee.

There are times of course when a man has to work long and strenuously. There are times when the clock is not a consideration. Such times must come especially to the business or professional man. When he has finished, however, he will be like the soldiers, he will try to forget it.

Nurses' Hours Much Too Long.

It is difficult to get nurses to serve in the hospitals, and it is no wonder. Nurses are expected to work on an average twelve hours a day. In some hospitals they work ten hours one week and fourteen the next. Imagine such a condition! Yet the nurse has to look pleasant all the time, must put up with trying patients and has no time to sit down. Surely it is time for the nurse to strike somebody.

(Sections 36 and 134.)
