SUBMARINE DISTURBANCE NEAR HERE

Dead Fish Strewed Sea and Muddy Water in Dixon Entrance

Confirmation of the news of the earthquake shock which was reported here two weeks ago in a special despatch to the Daily News from Masset is now received in the Alaska newspapers. The following is from the Alaska Daily Empire:

"A phenomenon, unexplained unless by the suggestion that it was due to an undersea eruption, has been reported to the Juneau Customs House by Deputy Collector A. P. Kashevaroff at Nakat Inlet, on Portland Canal. For days the waters of Dixon Entrance and adjacent thereto were muddy and discolored, and large numbers of dead fish of various kinds were reported.

"The report of the phenomenon received from Deputy Collector Kashevaroff addressed to John W. Troy, Collector of Customs, tells the story:

"Nakat Inlet, Alaska, 'I have the honor to report a phenomenon taking place here on the 12th day of May, or about that time. Beginning from the 12th day of May the sea water in our vicinity became very muddy and for two succeeding days the density of the mud increased until the 14th when the water was so muddy in the bay and in Dixon Entrance that objects a foot under the surface could not be seen. On May 15 fishermen trolling here as well as the natives reported the sea water very muddy from Cape Fox to the old village of Metlakatla, B. C., and up Portland Canal for a great distance. They reported a large number of dead fish, cod, red snapper and even king salmon, floating on the surface of the water. This was specially true as to the waters around Fillmore Inlet and down toward Metlakatla. From the above I would think there must have been some violent submarine upheaval or eruption. The fish must have been killed by gasses escaping from the bottom of the sea or some other deadly cause. I have interrogated a number of persons endeavoring to determine if there was any quake, but have met with none so far who experienced anything of the sort.

By collective buying in large numbers for cash, it can also offer soldiers the lowest possible prices on horses and other live stock.

It can supply a good harness set for approximately \$31.50 at point of manufacture.

All these concessions are in addition to the Board's offer to secure for the soldiers good

land, conveniently located, and to give financial assistance in the way of loans to establish them on the land.

Land and Loans

With certain exceptions, a soldier who has served with good conduct in the Canadian, Imperial or Allied forces in an actual theatre of war or outside the country in which he enlisted (or widow of any such man) may secure loans to purchase land, live stock and equipment and erect buildings—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 to cover the cost of the land and discharge encumbrances.
- (2) Up to \$1,000 to erect buildings. Both these loans to be paid on the instalment plan. Payments extending over 25 years.

- (3) Up to \$2,000 to buy implements, live stock, and equipment. The soldier will begin to pay off this loan in the third year, and will have four years to pay.

Only five per cent. will be charged on these loans.

A cash payment of one-tenth the price of the land will be required, except in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion Lands may secure loans up to a maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.
