Hospital Board Decides to Give Telkwa Fuel Trial-Order For Island Coal is Given

After hearing letters from C. C. ver Island fuel were set forth, the hospital board last night decided to ten tons of the Telkwa coal. Mr. Ketchum, in his letter, protested against the hospital calling for tenders exclusively for Vancouver Island coal. The Telkwa coal, Mr. Ketchum contended, was equal if not superior to the Vancouver Island coal and he saw no reason why a superior product of this district should be arbitrarily discriminated

Ald. Macdonald, chairman of the house committee, explained that, for some years, Vancouver Island coal has been accepted as the most economical fuel for the hospital. There was no intention to discriminate against a product of this district and he, for one, was in favor of giving it a trial. President W. M. Brown and other members of the board expressed similar sentiments and it was decided, on motion of Ald. Macdonald and Ald. Rudderham, to call for tenders for a trial consignment of ten tons of Bulkley

Valley slack coal for furnace use. The board also adopted a recommendation of the house committee accepting a tender of Philpott & Evitt for supply of Vancouver Island coal to the hospital. The figures of Philpott & Evitt were \$11.75 for double screen lump, \$10.80 for mine run and \$6.75 for slack. Albert & McCaffery bid \$12 on double screened lump, \$10.90 on mine run and \$6.90 on slack.


