

# THE SIGNING OF PEACE

SENATE MAKES DOMINION CRDER-IN-COUNCIL LAPSE CO-INCIDENT WITH THE SIGNING OF PEACE TERMS, PROHIBITING INTER-PROVINCIAL TRAFFIC IN ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, June 19 .- That the Orders-in-Council prohibiting the manufacture and transportation of intoxicating liquor shall terminate with the signing of the peace terms, has been declared by the Senate.

A bill was received in the Chamber from the House of Commons which sought to enact as a statute law the various ordersin-council proclaimed under the War Measures Act, was taken up by the Senate in committee of the whole. Senator Deveber offered an amendment striking out the words "and for twelve months thereafter" from the dec-
