DRAWING UP CANADA-BRITISH PACT

CAPT. VON GRONAU ANNOUNCES FURTHER FLIGHT PLANS

Trade Agreement Being Drafted Between This Country and Old Land

Official Announcement of Impending Accord is Made Today Following Meeting of Delegates, Canadian Cabinet and Cabinet Sub-Committees

OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—A trade agreement between Canada and the United Kingdom is being drafted as a result of discussions held during the Imperial economic conference. Official intimation to this effect came shortly before the luncheon hour today after a meeting of delegates, a long sitting of the Canadian cabinet and a session of the sub-committees of the Dominion cabinet. More details of the agreement will be made public within a few days, it is expected.

Hope Abandoned For Recovery of Mrs. McCormick

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Physicians announced yesterday that they had given up hope for the recovery of Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, who has been seriously ill for some time, and that death is only a matter of days and, perhaps, hours removed. Mrs. McCormick's children and her former husband, Harold McCormick, are at her bedside.

Robt. Sutherland Dies in Hospital

Seventy-Six Year Old Native of Scotland Had Been Patient For Over a Week

Robert Sutherland, formerly engaged as a crab fisherman and a resident of the city for years, died on Saturday at the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient since August 4. Deceased was 76 years of age and a native of Scotland. There are no relatives in this country as far as is known. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of Haynor Bros., undertakers.

SKEENA OFF TO STEWART

Canadian Destroyer Leaves For North After Five-Day Visit Here

After a five-day visit to port in the course of a coast cruise, H. M. C. S. destroyer Skeena, Commander George C. Jones, sailed at 10 o'clock yesterday morning for Stewart. After Stewart the Skeena will visit Anyox and proceed to Esquimalt via the Queen Charlotte Islands and the West Coast of Vancouver Island.

The bride, who entered the Cathedral upon the arm of her father by whom she was given in marriage, was charming indeed in her wedding dress of white Canton crepe and Spanish lace with conventional veil caught with small sprays of orange blossoms on either side of the head. United States Wins Eight and Four-Oared Rowing at Olympic Games; Canadians Finish Third

LONG BEACH, Cal., Aug. 15.—United States won the eight-oared event in connection with the Olympic Games on Saturday with Italy second, the Hamilton Leanders of Canada third and Great Britain fourth. United States also won the double sculls with Germany's second, Noel DeMille and Ned Pratt of Vancouver, Canada, third and Italy fourth.

Great Britain won the four-oared race without coxswain with Germany second, Italy third and United States fourth.

The Olympic Games came to a formal close yesterday afternoon with the presentation of winners after the finals of the horse jumping were completed with Japan winning. A great crowd of 100,000 persons was present.

The meeting at Los Angeles this year will go down in history as the "Miracle Olympiad" owing to the many high marks of athletic achievement that were recorded. Attendance records were also broken and the usual international bitterness was at a minimum.

German Aviator, Now In Manitoba, Expects To Be Home in Month

Will Start His Pacific Flight From Prince Rupert as Originally Reported—to Fly From Japan Over Russia

CORMORANT LAKE, Man., Aug. 15.—Capt. Wolfgang von Gronau, German trans-Atlantic flyer, who is spending a few days fishing here, today announced further plans for his Pacific Ocean flight from Prince Rupert to Tokyo via Alaska, the Aleutian Islands and the Kuriles. Von Gronau said that he expected to be back in Berlin after his world flight by the end of next month. He will fly from Japan over Soviet Russia to Kovna in Lithuania. From Prince Rupert von Gronau will fly to Cordova or Dutch Harbor and then to Paramushir.

SCHEDULES TO CHANGE

Fall and Winter C. N. R. Train and Steamer Services Announced

Effective at the end of this month, Canadian National steamers and trains will revert to reduced schedules for fall and winter.

Commencing August 29 from Prince Rupert, the steamer Prince Rupert will leave Vancouver at 8 o'clock Monday evenings, calling at Powell River and Ocean Falls and arriving here at 9:30 Wednesday mornings. The vessel will sail from Prince Rupert at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoons, arriving at Anyox at 11 p.m., leaving Anyox early Thursday, sailing from Stewart 11 a.m. Thursdays and arriving at Prince Rupert at 8 p.m. Thursdays. The vessel will sail from here at 10 p.m. Thursdays for Ocean Falls, Powell River and Vancouver, arriving at Vancouver 1:30 p.m. Saturdays.

The Prince John will continue her fortnightly service between Prince Rupert and Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, arriving here alternate Wednesday mornings commencing August 31 and sailing alternate Friday nights at 10 o'clock commencing September 2.

WAGE CUTS IMPENDING

United States Railroads to Meet to Consider Advisability of Making Further Slashes

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Representatives of United States railroads are expected to meet this week to discuss further reductions in wages of railway employees. This action is considered necessary in view of continued losses in operation of the railroads.
