# FAIR ARRANGEMENTS ARE WELL UNDER WAY

Novel Features Proposed This Year for the Exhibition Season Will Be Popular.

Among the attractions for the fair during the exhibition time in the fall this year are two novel ones which it is proposed to bring to town. Arrangements to this end are already well under way, and they should add largely to the interest of this annual occasion. One is a hydroplane, for which there is such scope in the harbor of Prince Rupert for the displaying of flying stunts. The second, however, will possibly prove the more interesting for the greater number, and it is a real old-fashioned "show," with a circus and barebacked horses, and a lady in spangles jumping through paper hoops, and clowns, and a man with topboots and a big whip, and a merry-go-round with a brass organ, and cocoanut shies and all the other fun producers usually connected with a real fair.

Negotiations are at present under way for the bringing of this institution to the city in the fall and it is safe to predict that if these are successful and this show comes, that those who will be the most delighted with the hobby horses will not be the children, either. Most of the grown-ups will take this opportunity of renewing their youth and many are looking forward with interest to the arrival of the real show.

The various committees are very busily engaged in completing their arrangements for this season's fair, which it is hoped to make a record.

# PUKKA POO BETTER GAME THAN FAN TAN

Fan Tan Tables Deserted When London Police Raided Gambling House—Pukka Poo is Favorite.

A new gambling game which it was stated has superseded fan tan among the patrons of the gaming houses in the Chinese quarter of London, was described at the Thames Street Police Court recently, when four Chinamen were charged with being concerned in running a gaming house, and nine others appeared as frequenters.

Superintendent Hopkins, who raided the house in Pennyfields said the fan tan tables were deserted and on the majority of the people in the house were found the papers used in playing pukka Poo. These papers, the Superintendent explained, contained representations of 80 Chinese symbols, including the dragon, the sea, a sword, gold and nuts. Those who took part in the game blotted out ten of the 80 characters, and once every hour, one of the principals also blotted out ten characters, at the same time chanting a Chinese song. A competitor fortunate enough to have blotted out the same ten characters as the man conducting the gamble, would in return for a shilling get £170, or if eight of the ten were right, he would receive £42.

# INFLUENZA KILLED WHOLE VILLAGES ON THE LABRADOR COAST

St. Johns, June 23.—An official investigation will be made into the results of the influenza epidemic in Labrador, where whole villages are reported to have lost the majority of their inhabitants. This has been ordered by the Government. Reports received here show that in the village of Okak all the men died and only some sixty women and children survived. Many bodies were devoured by dogs, there being no one left with sufficient strength to bury the dead. In a village named Habron only seven men and five women survived the epidemic.
