CITY'S REGULATIONS FOR SOLDIERS' BETTER HOUSING SCHEME
\$2,500 is Maximum to Be Loaned For Any One Dwelling—Widows With Dependents to be Considered First.

The Housing Committee of the City Council have prepared regulations under which soldiers and their dependents may obtain home building loans in connection with the Federal and Provincial Better Housing Scheme. These regulations consist of some seventeen clauses, and are general regulations and, of course, subject to modification to meet special cases should there be any such.

These regulations declare that the applicant must have been domiciled in the city not less than six months immediately prior to enlistment. Three aldermen shall compose the allotment committee, who shall satisfy themselves as to the bona fides of the applicants. Widows without property, having dependents, will have the first consideration. Next will come disabled soldiers without property and having dependents. Then widows partially dependent upon children's earnings or pensions, while married soldiers' applications will be considered according to length of service, number of dependents and financial condition.

The maximum sum to be loaned shall be \$2,500, which may be expended by the city in purchasing the site and erecting the dwelling, or this sum may be applied towards the construction of the house only. No person with an income if more than \$3,000 a year will be eligible under this scheme. If the applicant desires to purchase land on which to build, the committee will determine the reasonableness of the purchase price, and if need be may enter into negotiations with the vendor.

Returned soldiers are to have the first chance in working on the construction of these dwellings, and if the applicant be so qualified, he may contract to build his own house. The dwellings must be insured by the applicant and the policy made payable to the city. Occupation by the applicant shall constitute residence, and the applicant shall continuously reside upon the property for the full period of ten years.

The city reserves the right, at its discretion, to make such other disposal or settlement as may be deemed just and equitable.

GRAND JURY ADVISES AGAINST STRIKES
 Thinks it Necessary to Find Some Means Less Antiquated for Settling Differences of Opinion.

The Grand Jury of the Assize Court made its report to Mr. Justice Clement yesterday before its dismissal, in the following terms: To the Honorable Mr. Justice Clement,
 Your Lordship,—The Grand Jury presents that it has visited a number of the public institutions and has found them in satisfactory condition.
 It feels that at a time like this when the various representative bodies are concerned primarily in the adjusting of conditions as they exist at the close of the war, with the tremendous responsibilities that attach to such reconstruction, that it was well advised by your Lordship in refraining from making any recommendations looking to the expenditure of public money.
 It is felt, however, that it might well urge upon all concerned the grave necessity of arriving at some more rational and satisfactory method of settling industrial differences than by the antiquated system of strikes, with all their attendant evils affecting all classes, the employees, the employers and the great body of society at large, and might also urge upon all classes in the country that they lend their aid during this period of reconstruction to devise some way of ensuring against undue industrial unrest.
