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STRIKERS ARE MAKING MONEY AT VANCOUVER

While Street Cars Tied Up Jitneys Earn Big Sums and Serve the Public.

Arrivals on the steamer from Vancouver Saturday tell of a curious situation that has arisen there. While the street cars are all tied up, jitneys are operating on the streets by the hundred, every car available being impressed into the service. Some of these are being driven by the B. C. Electric employees, but most of them by shipyard workers and others who have had to leave their work but who had cars of their own or were able to hire them.

The jitney drivers take in anything from twenty to thirty dollars a day, most of them about twenty-three to twenty-five dollars. It costs them two dollars for gasoline and allowing five or six dollars for other expenses and wear and tear, they earn net about fifteen dollars a day. The result is that they are not at all anxious for the strike to end and some of them vote for it to continue.

As very few of the men have been earning more than seven or eight dollars a day at the shipyards and some less than four dollars, the strike has proved a bonanza for them. The question which is now being discussed is how long the jitneys are to continue after the strike is settled. The people generally are with the jitney men and the union men have been patronizing them right along. While they have had to pay ten cents a ride they have enjoyed an unusual luxury and have had the benefit of speed and an absence of straphanging.
