Registration of United States Citizens

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada of AGRA 21 to 30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY REGIS TERED POST with the registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and sad CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 20 and 31-44, both inclusion must so register during the ten days next FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918.

It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICAN LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, AND INCLUDES ALSO ALL THOSE WEG HAVE SECURED DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION OR HATE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, OR HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local postmare for despatch to the proper registrar, under the Milita Service Act.
