EARLY NAMING CABINET MEN

Expected President Elect will Announce State and Treasury Secretaries Soon

MARION, Ohio, Jan. 3.—President-elect Harding is considering announcing two Cabinet appointments soon after the first of the year, those of State and Treasury. He said today that no tenders have been made so far. The majority of the appointments probably will not be offered until he retires to some point in Florida during January.

With the Cabinet, as well as the international situation, still in a fluid, shifting state in the mind of Senator Harding, it is said to be his desire and purpose to make the initial appointments of State and Treasury heads the basis and groundwork for the formation of the rest of his official family.

No interference As each man is tendered the position one of the understandings that must be arrived at between him and Mr. Harding is the agreement to let the Reorganization Committee which the new administration will create to bring the government departments to a more economical administration have its own way in reaching into each department.

There will be no jealousy on the part of the incoming department heads, no holding on to bureaus and sub-departments, if the big commission decides to take them away. It is apparent that one of the chief things in the mind of the incoming executive is to build the government anew on a business basis. The selection of the man for this job is as important to him as a cabinet selection.

Await League Proposal The probability of any announcement by Mr. Harding of a concrete plan for a new League of Nations is lessening. It is not expected that he will come forward with any definite suggestions of his own on this line until he comes into power and has behind him the private assurances and support from the leaders of all factions in this country.
